
The biggest things to remember when looking at scholarship and award requirements is just to apply to them all!

Every institution in Canada has thousands of dollars every year in scholarships and awards that go unclaimed because no one applies.

Don't just look at the dollar amount, as of course, the larger the amount, the more people will apply, meaning competition can be stiff. The smaller award totals are often overlooked.

Do not worry if you think you only have the minimum requirements. Many students think the same thing — there has to be someone with higher grades, or more volunteering or leadership experience or a larger financial need — so they do not apply. Forget that.

Apply to them all!



WHAT IS AN AWARD, BURSARY & SCHOLARSHIP?

Award

These are one-time funds, and selection criteria varies: they could be based on academics, leadership, athletics, or — depending on the sponsor of the award — essays or financial need. Awards are not renewable, but it is possible to win several awards in a semester. Awards are not always financial! They can also come in the form of books, conference or membership registrations, or even school supplies for the coming semester.

Bursary

Bursaries are based on financial need. In addition to the paperwork required for a scholarship and/or award, you will also need:

Financial Information Form: on this form you'll provide information regarding your parents jobs, your job, estimated annual school expenses (including books) room/board and transportation.

Personal Statement: here you'll need to explain any specific circumstances that the bursary selection committee should be made aware of.

Testimonial Statement: this form should be from a parent or guardian regarding your financial need in support of your bursary application.

Scholarship

Scholarships are the best known financial assistance for students. They are most often merit based (or academic based) but they can also be based on sports, leadership/volunteering, etc. Many are renewable based on outlined requirements by the institution, but these tend to be ones that are offered starting from your second semester on. "Renewable" means you can continue to receive funds so long as you're eligible.

Students applying for scholarships must present a transcript of their high school grades, as well as a short-written description of their athletic and/or leadership qualities when these are specified in the scholarship applied for.

BAND FUNDING FOR POST-SECONDARY



What is band funding?

If you're a Band member of a First Nation, you may be eligible for federal funding, administered through your Band office, to help you pay for your education.

1. How do I apply for post-secondary funding from my band?

There is a process for applying for post-secondary funding from your band. The first step is to make initial contact with your band regarding postsecondary funding (phone call or in person visit).

Once contact is made the following information will need to be known:

- When is the application deadline?
- Is there any necessary paperwork that needs to be completed? (i.e. paper application, letter of intent, career investigation, FOIPP release of information, etc.)

2. What if I haven't ever contacted my band for anything?

This is not a problem as your name will appear on your band list and after contacting your band, they will be aware of your intentions to attend post-secondary. www.aadnc-aandc.gc.ca

3. What will I need to provide to be funded?

- Copy of your Indian Status card.
- Letter of conditional acceptance to post-secondary.
- Cost of tuition, books, and other applicable fees.
- Schedule for upcoming semester

4. How will I know if my funding has been approved?

- Your band will most likely contact you directly via telephone, letter mail, or email to inform you of their decision.
- As with anything else a follow up phone call is always a good choice.



Most bands prioritize applicants who are applying straight from high school.

5. What is typically covered with band funding?

- Living allowance for fulltime students.
- Tuition, books, any other costs related to your education.
- Part-time students: tuition and book fees only.
- Some bands will cover tutoring fees.

6. What is typically NOT covered with band funding?

- Personal items and services not crucial to course requirements.
- Personal liabilities, bill repayments, loans, or other financial debts. Students are encouraged to assess their personal financial status before committing to full time education.
- Fees for Health and Dental plans offered by colleges and universities.
- Computers, computer equipment, software and supplies.

7. What if I am Bill C-31?

If you are Bill C-31 Status and your band is located in Alberta, you will
most likely need to access funding via Freehorse Family Wellness Society.
Details regarding Freehorse Family Wellness Society's funding can be
found on page 10 of this handbook or by contacting the Freehorse
Wellness Society for further information.

8. What is Bill C-31?

- C-31 changed the registration system so that entitlement was no longer based on sexually discriminatory rules. The amendments, effective April 17, 1985:
 - a.) treat men and women equally;
 - b.) treat children equally whether they are born in or out of wedlock and whether they are natural or adopted;
 - c.) prevent anyone from gaining or losing status through marriage;
 - d.) restore Indian status for those who lost it through discrimination or enfranchisement;
 - e.) allow first-time registration of children (and in some cases descendants of subsequent generations) of those whose status is restored; and

- f.) allows for the registration of children born out of wedlock if either parent was a registered Indian, regardless of their date of birth. The federal government continues to maintain the Indian Register. Those who were recorded in the Indian Register when the amendments came into force continue to be recorded there. Those whose status was to be restored or who are eligible to be registered for the first time must apply to the Registrar to be recorded.
 - Two categories of persons were excluded from registration under the C31 provisions:
- a.) women who gained status only through marriage to a status Indian, and later lost it (e.g. through re-marriage to a non-Indian); and
- b.) children whose mother gained Indian status through marriage and whose father is non-Indian.

9. What if I am not Status Indian?

As a Non-Status Indian, you are eligible for various scholarships or bursaries.

10. What if I am Métis?

If you are a member of a Métis settlement you may be eligible to be sponsored through your settlement. Please contact your settlement for further information.

As a Métis student you are also eligible for various scholarships or bursaries. Please see page 10 of this handbook.



Band funding can limit some scholarships, awards and bursaries that you can apply for. Ensure you read all application requirements

MÉTIS FUNDING POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION



Rupertsland Institute Métis Post-Secondary Education Funding

Rupertsland Institute (RLI) provides post-secondary financial aid to Métis students to reduce the overall cost of education and the financial burden it can have.

Eligibility

Applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Must be a member of the Rupertsland Métis Students Association
- Must show proof of Métis citizenship by submitting either a Métis Nation of Alberta (MNA) citizenship card; current (MNA) card from a parent or grandparent; citizenship card from any of the governing members of the Métis National Council (Métis Nation British Columbia, Métis Nation Saskatchewan, Métis Nation Ontario) or the Manitoba Métis Federation, and proof of Alberta residency
- Must be enrolled in a recognized post-secondary program in Alberta or elsewhere in Canada
- Must work with an RLI Student Advisor to determine the level of support from Métis Students Services and commit to a student action plan
- Must sign a disclosure citing all sources of funding that the student is receiving or applying to receive including any financial support from
 - another Métis National Council member
- Show that training or retraining will lead to employment

Application Process

The application site will open on **May 15, 2024** for returning students and in **June 2024** for new students.

Belcourt Brosseau Métis Awards (BBMA)

The BBMA was established in 2001 at the Edmonton Community Foundation to assist Albertan Métis students financially in realizing their educational and occupational goals with scholarships up to \$10,000 each year for post-secondary education.

Eligibility

- Applicants must be:
- Recognized or registered members with the Métis Nation of Alberta or a Métis Settlement (Note: only a letter saying you applied for membership is required to apply)
- Alberta Residence & Canadian Citizenship
- Intend to pursue a program of study leading to a recognized license, certificate, diploma, or undergraduate of professional degree in Alberta.
- Primary consideration is given to applications demonstrating financial need, connection to Métis community, likelihood of improved career opportunities.
- Consideration and priority may also be given to applicants:
 - -entering their first year of post-secondary studies or academic upgrading, or in bridging, and university/college entrance programs
 - -demonstrating commitment to studies and maturity (for more detail see the website)
 - -with a history of volunteer work and leadership
 - -with extenuating personal circumstances
 - -who will study full-time

How to Apply

- Applicants must complete an online application on the Edmonton Community Foundation website
- Applicants must provide one completed "Reference Forms" or letters of reference and a copy of their most recent marks.
- Applicants must provide proof of Métis ancestry

Deadline to apply

Applications deadline is March 31st (annually)

Métis Settlements Strategic Training Initiatives

The Métis Settlements Strategic Training Initiatives ('MSSTI') is a society formed by the Métis Settlements to provide training and educational opportunities to Métis Settlement Members. MSSTI assist our members with entering or re-entering the workforce, retaining active employment, or enhancing their skills to advance in their chosen profession. Our top priority is to ensure that Settlement Members have meaningful opportunities for employment.

Eligibility

Applicants must be:

- Métis person physically residing on a Settlement, or a Settlement Member on authorized leave of absences as defined by the Métis Settlement Act, Section 85. Settlements include:
 - Buffalo Lake, East Prairie, Elizabeth, Fishing Lake, Gift Lake, Kikino, Paddle Prairie, Peavine
- Legally entitled to work in Canada.
- Have a Social Insurance Number (SIN) prior to approval.
- In good standing under previous funding programs by the Métis Settlement Strategic Initiatives Society
- Must require assistance to overcome existing or anticipated labour market barriers.
- Proposed training must fulfill an area of need or be part of a defined career plan.
- 18 years of age or a high school graduate. If a student is currently enrolled in the public school system and drops out of school to apply for an MSSTI project, the student will not be eligible to receive sponsorship. MSSTI does not sponsor students who are enrolled within the public system

How to Apply

- Complete the application and Career Investigation provided on the MSSTI website.
- Submit your application to your Settlement HRO or through MSSTI Central Office.
- Include your letter of acceptance from the training or educational institution, which should include the details of your program, course outlines and associated costs (tuition, books, supplies, student fees, etc).
- All individuals applying for MSSTI sponsorship must have a SIN prior to being approved.

Deadline to apply

Students must apply a minimum of 4 weeks prior to the start date of the program.

Apeetogosan (Métis) Development Inc: The Rebecca Kelln Métis Bursary Fund

Apeetogosan started offering bursaries for first year Métis students back in 2007. The Rebecca Kelln Métis bursary fund is named for a former employee who was diagnosed with cancer in 2011. This bursary program is named in her honour.

The funding is available to students for the first year while attending any recognized post-secondary institution, and there are no restrictions on how the funds are expensed.

Eligibility

- Provide evidence that they are Métis
- Have a financial need
- Have been an Alberta resident for at least three years prior to applying
- Demonstrate an investment in, and a commitment to, a community in Alberta

How to Apply

- Download the application form
- Attach a certified copy of transcripts
- Be enrolled in a recognized post-secondary institution (community college or University in Canada)
- Provide a "letter of acceptance" and confirmation of a full-time course load (available from the school's admissions or registrar's office)
 Submit completed application forms via email, fax, or mail

SCHOLARSHIPS & BURSARIES APPLICATION TIPS



- 1. If you have questions, ask them! It's better to ask and be 100% clear than be unsure and make a mistake.
- 2. Check deadline dates and give yourself enough time to complete applications and gather supporting documents.
- 3. Always print two copies of the application and information. One copy for rough draft/personal records and one copy to send in.
- 4. READ the entire application before filling in blanks and identify what you'll need before applying (ex: forms, essay, letters, etc.).
- 5. Request transcripts early. If you have to send transcripts at the end of the semester/year, indicate on your application that you will forward them later.
- 6. Select a minimum of two people who can write references on your behalf (grad coach, teacher, pastor, etc.).
- 7. NEVER send in a hand-written letter/essay on loose-leaf. Type your essay and sign the bottom.
- 8. Review and EDIT your application. Make sure it has no errors or spelling mistakes.
- 9. Place your CLEAN, unfolded application and supporting documents in a brown envelope.
- 10. This booklet is only a selection of scholarships and bursaries; there are thousands of financial aids that are available. Make sure you search and apply for as many scholarships and bursaries as you can!
- 11. Apply for scholarships and bursaries even if you don't meet all the criteria described in the posting. Remember they are describing the ideal candidate and if you write a compelling essay your application may be considered, especially if they receive a limited number of applicants.

STUDENT CHECK LIST

1. Proof of Enrollment

All scholarships will require proof of enrollment. This could be your acceptance letter or specified letter stating your enrollment. Most Institutions will have a proof of enrollment option on their student accounts portal. Ask your Bridging Futures coordinator how to access it!

2. Transcripts

Merit-based scholarships almost always require your transcripts

(high school and/or college, depending on your current education)

(high school and/or college, depending on your current education) as they are looking for students who have over a certain GPA.

For scholarships that are available for renewal, they may also require your transcripts to see that you're maintaining the required GPA. If you fail to meet this scholarship requirement, you could lose out on the award.

Financial Details

For need-based awards, financial details are a common scholarship requirement. Applications may ask for financial information, income and budget. This will help demonstrate your financial need.

4. Essay

It's not uncommon for a scholarship to require you to send an essay along with your application. The essay's criteria vary greatly from each award, so read the rules before you start writing! In some cases, the essay may present you with a particular prompt, such as "What are your plans if you win this award?" or "Why do you deserve to win?". Check out the "Essay Writing Tips" section of this booklet.

Cover Letter 5.

A cover letter can help strengthen and contextualize your application for a scholarship. Scholarship cover letters aim to show the review committee why you're the best candidate for a scholarship and how the award might benefit your studies.

Resume

A resume is an important document that reflects your skills, experience and assets. It is a document that summarizes your work and volunteer history, education, skills and accomplishments as they relate to the scholarship or award that you are applying for.

7. Letter of Recommendation

Proof of Identification

A letter of recommendation is a document that outlines an individual's qualities, character, skills and credibility. It supports your application for a scholarship, showing that you're capable of being a competent student.

The author of a recommendation letter is a professional who knows you and can speak candidly about your academic strengths and goals.

Most scholarships require you to send proof of identification. Have a copy of your ID (front and back) saved as a PDF file.

Also, some scholarships specifically for Indigenous students require proof of ancestry. Proof of ancestry can include Indian Status cards, Metis Card etc. have a PDF (front and back) saved as well!

Having an already prepared essay with an Intro can save you time in preparing your application. Ensure you read **ALL** essay writing criteria! Note that some scholarship applications have their own specific writing prompts!

Build a Scholarship Toolbox

What, you might ask, is a scholarship toolbox? Basically, it's just all of the resources and knowledge you'll need to slay the scholarship application process!

The items you'll need for your toolbox are listed in the **student checklist.**

Other items that might be helpful to include:

- Personal information Name, address, email address, SIN number etc.
- **School Information** Name, address, proof of enrollment, fee assessment, course schedule etc.
- Past Scholarship Essays using your past essays as a tool to pull examples from
- **Photo of you** (Optional) some scholarships will ask for a non-blurry photo of you to post on their websites or use it for promotional purposes.

ADVANCING FUTURES BURSARY

FOR INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

Advancing Futures Bursary is a post-secondary bursary program for current and former youth in government care aged 18-24. The program provides social and emotional supports and funding to eligible students while they pursue postsecondary studies, such as:

- Obtaining their high school equivalency through adult education;
- Earning a degree/diploma from a post- secondary school;
- · Learning a trade;
- · Earning a license or certificate.

Eligibility

- Be between 18-24 years old at the time they apply
- · Be a full- or part-time student enrolled at an approved institution, and
- Have been a youth in government care as a result of an Alberta-based agreement or order
- They must also have:
- Had a Permanent Guardianship Order (PGO) between the time they were 13 and 18 years old, OR
- Been in the care or custody of Alberta Human Services for at least 546 days (18 months) between the time they were 13 and 24 years old.

ALBERTA BLUE CROSS ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP

Deadline to Apply:

FOR INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

Alberta Blue Cross has established three awards for Indigenous students who are completing their high school education and entering their first year of postsecondary study at an accredited institution.

These scholarships are based primarily on community involvement, personal goals, and financial need. Scholastic achievement will also be considered. The amount of the award varies according to the institution the student will be attending.

Value of awards: Alberta Blue Cross issues three awards each year. Awards range from \$750 to \$1,500.

Eligibility

- Applicants are a First Nation Band Member, or have Inuit, Métis or Indian Status as referenced on the Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada website.
- Applicants must be enrolled in the first year of any full-time postsecondary certificate or diploma program of two or more years duration.
- Applicants must clearly describe their community involvement, personal goals, and financial need.
- Applicants must have been residents of Alberta during their most recent year of study.
- Applicants must submit three reference letters for evaluation.

High School Youth Researcher Summer Program (HYRS)University of Alberta

The Alberta Innovates High School Youth Researcher Summer Program (HYRS) offers paid, six week summer research experiences for Grade 11 students in health and medical sciences, including priority areas in digital health, data-enabled health transformation, and health innovation. The objectives of the HYRS program are to:

- Increase awareness and interest in research & innovation (R&I) careers - particularly at the intersection of health and emerging technologies
- Create opportunities for emerging talent to acquire experience and connections in Alberta's health R&I ecosystem.
- Increase the competitiveness of Alberta as a destination for R&I talent.
- Leverage partner relationships to advance Digital Health Innovation in Alberta.

In addition to gaining first-hand research experience, HYRS students also participate in a range of skill development and career exploration activities. This program is ideal for students who have an interest in science and health, and are looking to explore careers in health research and innovation.

July 3 -August 14, 2024 (in-person)

Students accepted to the HYRS program will be paid for 30-35 hours/week for 6 weeks (approximately. **\$15/hour**).

Eligibility

To be eligible to apply for the HYRS program at the University of Alberta, students must:

- Be currently enrolled in Grade 11, and must have completed, or be currently enrolled in (at minimum) Mathematics 20-1 or 20-1, Biology 20, and one other Grade 11 science course
- · Reside north of Red Deer
- Be legally eligible to work in Canada
- Demonstrate an interest in health/medical sciences, and an open-mind toward exploring careers in health research and innovation.

Students must normally have a combined average of 85% in Mathematics 20-1 or 20-2, Biology 20, and one other Grade 11 science course. High school grades are not considered beyond the 85% threshold. Students who do not meet the 85% threshold may be considered for the HYRS program if there is a strong justification on the basis of equity or program accessibility (e.g. limitations on 20-level science course offerings, or other extenuating circumstances).

HYRS encourages applications from members of groups with historical and/or current barriers to equity, including, but not limited to, First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples, and all other Indigenous peoples; members of groups that commonly experience discrimination due to race, ancestry, colour, religion and/or spiritual beliefs, or place of origin; persons with disabilities; persons who identify as women; and persons of marginalized sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions.
