



You can support your child to ask and answer 'where' questions by reminding them what 'where' means. You can say,



- First, start by asking your child **concrete** questions, that are based in the *here and now*. For example, “Where are your eyes?”.

When your child has success with those types of questions, you can move towards asking more **abstract** questions, that are *outside your immediate surroundings*. For example, “Where do cows live?”.



Day 2: In the car or on a walk, give your child different items to search for by asking 'where' questions: "Where is a stop sign?", "Where is a dog?"

Day 3: Reading stories,
take turns asking 'where'
questions with your child:
"Where is the sheep
sleeping?", "Where did the
boy go?"

Day 4: Hide a favorite toy of your child's, and give them clues where to find it by asking 'where' questions: after hiding the toy in the sink, ask "Where do you wash your hands?"

BINGO!

You can make your own BINGO game by cutting pictures of places out of magazines or having your child draw places of their own. Then, create questions about those places with your child. This activity encourages your child to think about how to ask and answer 'where' questions. When your BINGO cards are ready, ask questions to your child(ren) and see who is first to cover all pictures in a line and say "BINGO!".

Tip: Use small items, such as pompoms or coins, to cover the pictures so that you can reuse them.
