Background:

Alberta Education requires all school jurisdictions to submit a Three-Year Education Plan annually. The Three-Year Education Plan, which we refer to as our Division Plan for Continuous Growth, must be approved by the Board of Trustees and posted on our Division's website by May 31 of each year.

Our Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026 (Year 3) provides priorities determined by the Board, goals, strategies that address both local goals and system priorities, and performance measures.

Central to the Division Plan for Continuous Growth is our mission to provide a Catholic education that inspires students to learn and that prepares them to live fully and to serve God in one another. We aim to develop strategies and priorities that will inspire our students and ensure their success by giving them the tools they need to succeed.

This is the third year of our three-year fixed plan that started in 2023. Implementing a fixed plan strategy allows us to carry out sustained work in each of our priorities with the intent to create the conditions to foster consistency of practice in identified areas for lasting impact. In utilizing a fixed plan model, we have the ability to evaluate our progress in our goals on a yearly basis and modify or develop additional strategies to target areas of growth required in order to support our Division's priorities.

Our engagement processes also involve the evaluation and reporting of provincial and local measures to our public. ECSD accomplishes this via the Division Assurance Dashboard which gives the public real time access to metrics that will measure our growth within each one of the priorities. This includes the results from our Edmonton Catholic Schools' Annual Survey which is organized into themes that mirror the priorities of the Division and the Alberta Education Assurance Measures that are reported from their Assurance Survey.

We aim to develop strategies and priorities that will inspire our students and ensure their success by giving them the tools they need to succeed.

This is the third year of a new three-year fixed plan cycle. Implementing a fixed plan allows us to carry out sustained work in each of our priorities with the intent to create the conditions to foster consistency of practice in identified areas for lasting impact. This plan is grounded in four priorities which have been established by the Board in response to multiple engagements in advance of year one. Each priority has associated goals. The priorities and goals will remain fixed for the three-year planning cycle. We have the ability to evaluate our goals on a yearly basis and modify or develop additional strategies to target areas of growth required in order to actualize our Division's priorities.

ENGAGEMENT:

Development of the Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026 involved effective engagement with educational partners. The process began with a facilitated strategic planning session with the Board to examine the work of the Division at a departmental level. Principals and Division leaders also provided feedback on this work. The input of the school councils from each of our schools provided during our Community of School Councils Engagement in October of 2022 also provides valuable insights into the pieces of work that resonated with families.

The Board of Trustees then established the Division priorities for this three-year fixed cycle. The Division subsequently developed broad enough goals that provide the Division with the flexibility to be responsive throughout the three-year plan period to modify the strategies under each goal, in order to address emergent needs. Administration then worked with Division leadership and school principals to determine the goals for the duration of the planning cycle and strategies specific to Year 1 of the plan. Our final engagement on the plan was with our Student Voice members, who shared what types of actions they would expect to see in their schools in light of the goals and strategies. For Year 2, key strategies were refined in Goal F2 and Goal O1 to provide more clarity based on results from our ECSD Annual Survey 2023-2024. In Year 3, based on engagement with senior administration who are in constant dialogue with principals, the language of the key strategies was simplified to make it more relatable to the general public and non-teaching staff. Effort was made to remove pedagogical jargon wherever possible.

The Division has also planned responsive supports to address specific areas of concern with respect to Provincial Achievement Tests and Diploma Examinations. These supports are presented in the <u>Provincial Achievement Testing Response Report</u> and <u>Diploma Examinations Response Report</u> in November 2024.

IMPLEMENTATION:

Planning for the implementation of Year 3 of the Division Plan for Continuous Growth is underway and will build on the document <u>Supporting Implementation</u> 2024-2025.

Re: Edmonton Catholic Schools Three-Year Capital Plan 2026-2029

Background:

In compliance with provincial directives, the Edmonton Catholic School Division (ECSD) evaluates its school capital requirements annually, developing a prioritized list of projects based on factors such as enrolment pressures, health and safety needs, demographics, facility condition, and equity of access to Catholic education. These priorities are presented in a Three-Year Capital Plan, which is subject to approval by the Board of Trustees on an annual basis. Once approved, the plan is forwarded to Alberta Education for funding consideration.

Fiscal Year and Submission

The fiscal year for capital plans spans from April 1 to March 31, and the Three-Year Capital Plan is due by April 1 of the preceding year.

Capital Plan 2026-2029

The Three-Year Capital Plan 2026-2029 outlines ECSD's primary school facility needs for the next three years, categorizing capital projects as new construction, replacement, solution, or modernization. Each project is assigned a priority ranking based on an assessment of key performance indicators through ECSD's capital planning framework. The plan consolidates these priorities into a list of 11 capital projects, with a strong emphasis on ensuring equitable access to Catholic education for all students across the Division.



Funding Request

ECSD is requesting \$554 million in funding for Year 1 priorities. These funds will be used to address growing student capacity demands, enhance learning environments, and prioritize equity in access to educational opportunities. The plan aims to alleviate severe enrolment pressures in planning sectors and schools experiencing critical over-utilization, particularly at the high school level. Additionally, the plan seeks to optimize utilization across the Division, reduce operational and maintenance expenses, and revamp aging infrastructure to deliver modern learning environments.

Enrolment Pressures and Capacity

Despite the success in obtaining capital approvals for six new Catholic K-9 schools, 33 new modular classrooms, the opening of Father Michael McCaffery Catholic High School, and the anticipated openings of St. Josephine Bakhita Catholic Elementary/Junior High School and Blessed Carlo Acutis Catholic High School, ECSD projects continued enrolment pressures. These pressures highlight the need for additional new schools, particularly in high-growth areas.

The current overall utilization rate of 100% signals that ECSD has no available space to accommodate future growth. With minimal capacity left to manage overflow from severely overcrowded schools, the Division will face significant challenges in handling enrolment pressures. Opening new schools is the only sustainable long-term solution to these growing enrolment issues. Given the critical and time-sensitive nature of this issue, it is essential that additional capacity, in the form of new schools, is prioritized.

While ECSD has successfully opened Father Michael McCaffery Catholic High School this year, all other high schools in the Division are currently operating at over 100% capacity. High school enrolment faces the most imminent pressure, with utilization rates projected to exceed capacity, particularly in the West, Southwest, and Southeast high school planning sectors. These sectors are expected to reach up to 149% utilization within the next five years. Despite the opening of Father Michael McCaffery Catholic High School, ECSD anticipates that the additional capacity provided will not be sufficient to meet the growing demand.

Government Support

The Government of Alberta's School Construction Accelerator Program (SCAP), which aims to create over 200,000 new and modernized student spaces, aligns perfectly with ECSD's needs at this crucial time.

Project Priorities

ECSD recommends the submission of the following projects and their priorities to Alberta Education as part of the Three-Year Capital Plan 2026-2029. Upon approval by the Board of Trustees, these priorities will be entered into the provincial database system, along with copies of Site Readiness Checklists and other relevant supporting documentation.

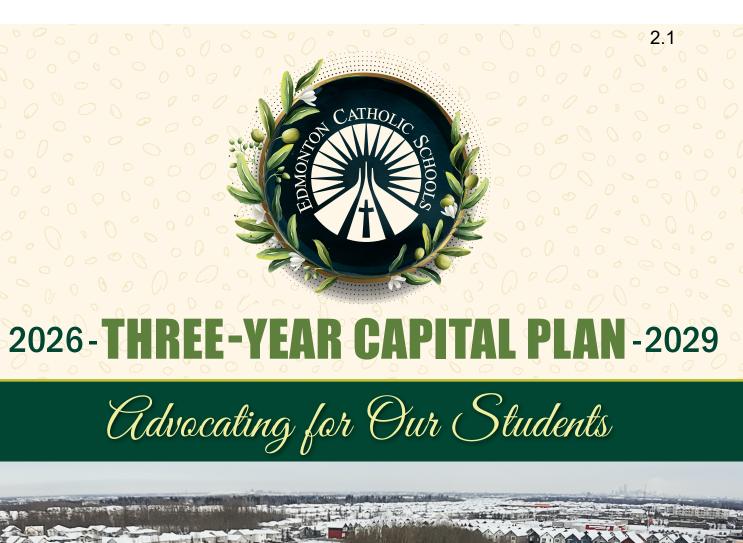

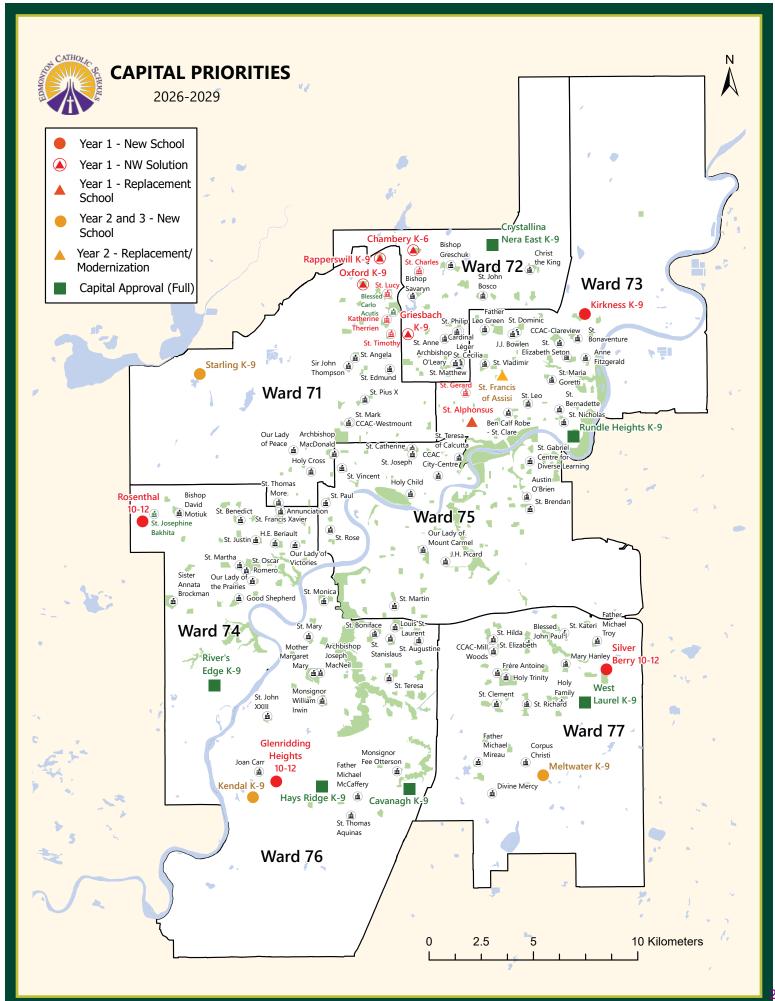

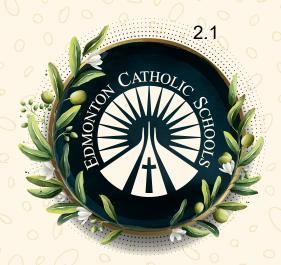

Edmonton Catholic Schools

The 2026-2029 Capital Plan addresses significant enrolment pressures, especially in our High Schools. Without new schools, overcrowding will continue to be an issue. Some schools will see utilization rates reach 150%. This affects students' access to quality learning environments, which are essential to an excellent Catholic education.

The Capital Plan reflects steps that must be taken to improve teaching and learning conditions for students and staff.

Enrolment at Edmonton Catholic Schools has surpassed 50,000 students, indicating an increasing demand for Catholic education.

Nearly half of ECSD's schools (42 out of 92) are operating beyond their intended capacity despite adding 33 modular classrooms to overcrowded schools throughout the city.

ECSD is at 100% overall utilization and does not have the space to support further growth.

Even with the addition of the 1,330-capacity Father Michael McCaffery Catholic High School, ECSD remains short by more than 1,000 high school spaces. This has led to overcrowding in almost every high school.

ECSD has implemented temporary measures in several school communities to redirect students to less crowded schools. This increases travel times for students and greatly impacts our families.

ECSD is committed to a Northwest Solution that ensures equitable access to Catholic education. The 2026 opening of Blessed Carlo Acutis Catholic High School will help bridge program gaps and expand opportunities but with no Catholic Junior High in the area, more work is needed to ensure students have a clear path from elementary to high school.

There are several areas of the city where aging infrastructure no longer meets the educational needs of our students. Replacement schools or major modernizations are required.

Our Division is committed to ensuring that every child has access to the teaching and learning environments they deserve.

Introduction

The Edmonton Catholic School Division (ECSD) Three-Year Capital Plan 2026-2029 identifies the Division's priorities for the upcoming three years. Since 2021, ECSD's student enrolment has surged by over 22%, surpassing pre-COVID-19 levels. This rapid growth, driven by record migration from within Canada and abroad, is expected to continue at an accelerated pace.

With overall utilization now at 100%, ECSD has reached full capacity and accommodating additional students will be extremely challenging. While school divisions across Alberta are experiencing growth, ECSD is among the most highly utilized, leaving limited classroom space for programming. To meet the needs of current and future students, the Division urgently requires new schools to provide quality learning environments and equitable access to Catholic education.

Planning for future growth, optimizing utilization and aging facilities across the school division, this report identifies capital priorities of these capital project types:

New School Construction

Addresses the increasing demand for student spaces in Edmonton's rapidly growing communities by providing new schools where they are needed most.

Replacement School

Ensures cost-effective solutions for aging infrastructure by replacing schools that are no longer operationally or financially sustainable due to deterioration.

Modernization

Enhances the functionality, safety, and efficiency of existing schools through major and minor upgrades to improve learning environments.

The 2026-2029 Capital Plan aims to address significant enrolment pressures, particularly in the High School sector. Without the necessary capital investments, some areas could experience utilization rates exceeding 150%, placing immense strain on existing facilities.

A lack of adequate school infrastructure will also pose a major challenge to equitable access to Catholic education across Ed monton. Without new schools and expansions, many families may face barriers in accessing faith-based education within their communities.

The Three-Year Capital Plan 2026-2029 is approved by the Board of Trustees and submitted to Alberta Education for provincial funding approval.

Capital Planning Framework

The Capital Planning Framework establishes the principles, process, and methodology by which school capital requirements are analyzed and prioritized. used to analyze and prioritize school capital requirements, resulting in a ranked list of major projects including new schools, school consolidations, and the replacement or modernization of existing facilities. The aspects of the framework are evaluated in the Ten-Year Strategic Facility Plan, and subsequently in the Three-Year Capital Plan.

Planning Principles, Vision, and Core Values

All ECSD strategic planning aligns with the Division's Student Accommodation Planning Principles, as well as the Division's Mission, Vision, and Core Values.

Student Accommodation Planning Principles:

- Ensure fair and equitable access to facilities for all students.
- Provide equal opportunities for students to access various program choices.
- Maintain a fiscally and environmentally responsible to infrastructure planning.
- Commit to clear, coordinated, and transparent decision-making process.

Consistent application of planning principles is applied throughout the development of the Ten-Year Facilities Strategic Plan, the Three-Year Capital Plan, the Modular Program, and any updates made to the school attendance boundaries.

Mission:

The mission of Edmonton Catholic Schools is to provide a Catholic education that inspires students to learn and that prepares them to live fully and to serve God in one another. The mission is inspired by love of the Father, Faith in Jesus Christ and hope from the Holy Spirit.

Vision:

Our students will learn together, work together, and pray together in answering the call to a faith-filled life of service.

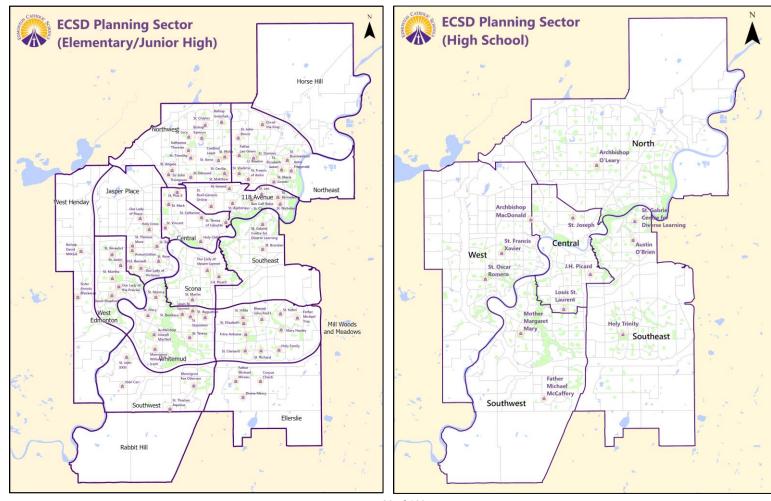

ECSD Planning Sectors

In 2022, ECSD updated its K-9 planning sectors to align with the City of Edmonton's new District Plans. These planning sectors consist of clusters of schools grouped by geographical boundaries, encompassing multiple neighbourhoods that share common characteristics (e.g., mature vs. new communities). By aligning its planning sectors with the City of Edmonton, ECSD can collaborate more effectively to advocate for school sites and ensure Catholic education remains a viable option across all communities. This approach allows ECSD to gain deeper insights into how specific areas are served, enabling informed decisions on school development and programs.

Through sector-based analysis, ECSD proactively plans for educational delivery across the city and identifies areas in need of capital investment. However, while planning sectors help define general areas of need, capital priorities require a thorough, project-specific analysis. These sectors serve as an initial reference point, with more detailed assessments shaping the Division's top capital priorities.

Prioritization Process

The Ten-Year Strategic Facilities Plan includes an in-depth sector analysis to assess student accommodation and facilities needs across the city. This analysis helps identify the unique characteristics of each sector by evaluating existing conditions (housing, schools, enrolment, programs, operations, and maintenance costs), future projections, student demographics and neighbourhood growth trends. Key Performance Indicators (KPI) are established to guide the prioritization of capital requirements and help determine the most urgent facility needs.

Key Performance Indicators include:

- **Enrolment and Utilization:** Measures the school, sector, or jurisdiction's ability to accommodate students by comparing current and projected enrolment against capacity.
- Facility Condition: Assesses school infrastructure using the Facility Condition Index (FCI) which compares the five-year maintenance cost requirements including all deferred maintenance costs against the total replacement cost of a facility.
- Operational Efficiency: Evaluates the Division's ability to balance operational, maintenance and renewal costs with the funding received from the government (O&M and IMR/CMR).
- Program Functionality: A qualitative measure of a facility's ability to effectively support educational programming.

Capital Prioritization Process Capital needs must also consider additional factors such as previous project approval, project site readiness, potential partnership opportunity, and ECSD's Optimal Learning Strategic Plan (Student/Program Accommodation Plan). These priorities are categorized by the Project Driver that they address, as per the Alberta Education's School Capital Manual, and ranked based on level of urgency and ability to accommodate the most critical needs of the Division. For additional details regarding the prioritization process, refer to the Ten-Year Strategic Facilities Plan.

The Three-Year Capital Plan builds on the analysis outlined in the Ten-Year Strategic Facilities Plan to identify and rank capital priorities that address the most important needs of the Division.

Project Drivers

Building Condition

These are demonstrated and documented deficiencies in the major building components; structural deficiencies; building envelope issues; deficiencies and/or issues with the interior mechanical and/or electrical components; building code and/or standards compliance issues that could not be resolved with available Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal (IMR) funding.

Community Renewal

School capital projects that contribute to the redevelopment and sustainability of a school community and/or surrounding neighbourhood. These projects will promote efficient use of space within a community or surrounding neighbourhood.

Efficiency Solutions

School capital projects that provide operational efficiencies through the modernization, replacement, or consolidation of existing space to provide a more optimal learning environment where the available space is more aligned with the student enrolment.

Enrolment Pressures

The school jurisdiction's existing facilities are insufficient to accommodate current and future students within a specified geographical area.

Functionality and Programming

Projects provide new and/or improved program space functionality through reconfiguration, relocation, or technology. Examples of issues may include the lack of functional capacity to deliver the curriculum in the intended manner, ease of supervision, lockdown capability, sound, and light quality, etc.

Health and Safety

Projects that address risks to the health, safety, or security of the students or staff either immediately or in the longer term; projects that address compliance issues with federal or provincial legislation or municipal bylaws.

Legal

Projects are evaluated on legal rights for equity of access and assessed regarding existing legal judgement or potential legal action (e.g., Rights to Francophone education under Section 23 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms).

Facilities at a Glance

ECSD currently operates 92 active schools, not including online, outreach and closed schools. School jurisdictions are responsible for ensuring that the health, safety, and essential maintenance needs for each board-owned facility are addressed. And as such, it is the Division's responsibility to maintain these facilities to provide a safe, healthy, and sustainable environment for student learning. The table on the right provides an overview of the current state of the Division's school facilities and its maintenance requirements.

ECSD has been able to manage the condition of its school facilities resulting in an average overall FCI of 0.20 (FAIR). However, it is notable that one of every ten schools are in poor condition. The Division also has a significantly high Deferred Maintenance at \$454 million which is forecasted to swell to \$495 million in ten years. A large majority of this amount is due to lifecycle maintenance requirements

that have been deferred, which is a symptom of the age of the school buildings operated by the Division. Capital solutions are required for schools in poor condition while being prudent and intentional in utilizing IMR/CMR funding.

Note: An analysis of Alberta Infrastructure's VFA data in 2024 indicates that the FCI value may be artificially low due to a significant increase in the replacement values of facilities that offset the increase in maintenance costs.

Maintenance and Renewal

Alberta Education provides funding for the maintenance and renewal of schools through the Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal (IMR) and Capital Maintenance and Renewal (CMR) programs. CMR (stimulus) was first introduced by the government in the 2020-21 school year to help stimulate the slowing economy that resulted from the COVID-19 pandemic. These funds were used to upgrade the Division's facilities to minimize transmission of the virus as well as address the most urgent maintenance and renewal requirements. The government advanced funds that were originally allocated for future years under the IMR program. As a result, future IMR/CMR allocations will be lower to recoup the amount advanced for the CMR stimulus.

City Growth and Development

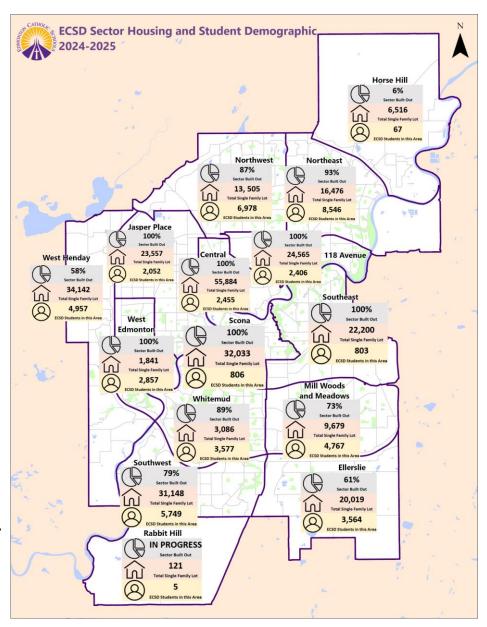
The City of Edmonton has grown at an exuberant pace. The 2021 federal census recorded Edmonton's population over 1 million residents, this equated to an 8.3% increase in a five-year span. This growth was influenced by several factors including international immigration; national migration within provinces; and economic influences.

In October 2024, the federal government announced a new immigration plan which aims to stabilize population growth and the housing market. The new plan will result in a 0.2 per cent population decline over two years; reducing the projected number of new permanent residents from 485,000 this year to 395,000 in 2025.

September 2024 enrolment numbers revealed a 4.9% increase compared to the previous year, with 2,332 additional students. This increase is reflective of the city's 4.5% increase in population in 2024. There are several factors that have influenced the growth including families moving to Edmonton from within Canada, as well as internationally. The city anticipates a 2.3% population change by 2025. This is a 2.2 percent decrease from 2025. As ECSD growth directly correlates with the city's population growth trends, ECSD can predict a decrease and levelling of enrollment. This change is largely influenced by the federal government's new immigration plans.

Planning Sectors

The Planning Sectors that have experienced the most residential growth in the last five years include: West Henday, Southwest, Mill Woods and Meadows, Northwest, Northeast, and Ellerslie. These sectors are located closer to the outskirts of the city, where significant residential development is underway. 70% of ECSD students (around 35,000 students) reside in these six planning sectors, and as they continue to build-out, enrolment pressures will grow. It is crucial for ECSD to proactively plan for new schools in these sectors specifically, as they will have increasingly high demand.

Enrolment Trends

Over the past ten years, ECSD's adjusted enrolment has grown from approximately 38,000 to over 52,000. This enrolment growth is equivalent to an average growth rate of 3.8% per year. In the same period, the Division's capacity has grown by approximately 7,500 which is only around half of the enrolment growth.

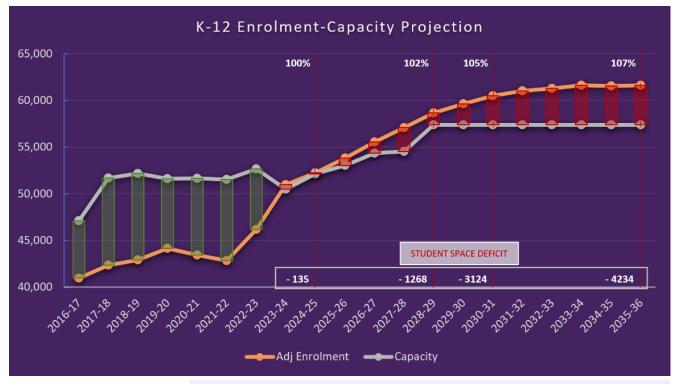
ECSD's adjusted enrolment is projected to grow from 52,000 to 62,000 by 2035.

Additional capacity is expected with the upcoming openings of St. Josephine Bakhita Catholic Elementary/Junior High School in the West Henday Sector in 2025, Blessed Carlo Acutis High School in the North Sector in 2026, and the newly approved K-9 schools in Crystallina, Cavanagh, and Hays Ridge in 2028. Together, these new schools will add around 5,000 student spaces to the Division, helping to improve utilization upon their opening. However, with enrolment continuing to rise, utilization is expected to remain over 100% unless more new schools are introduced.

The current overall utilization rate of 100% signals that ECSD has no available space to accommodate future growth. With minimal capacity left to manage overflow from severely overcrowded schools, the Division will face significant challenges in handling enrolment pressures.

Opening new schools is the only sustainable long-term solution to these growing
enrolment issues. Given the critical and time-sensitive nature of this problem, it is
essential that additional capacity, in the form of new schools, is prioritized.

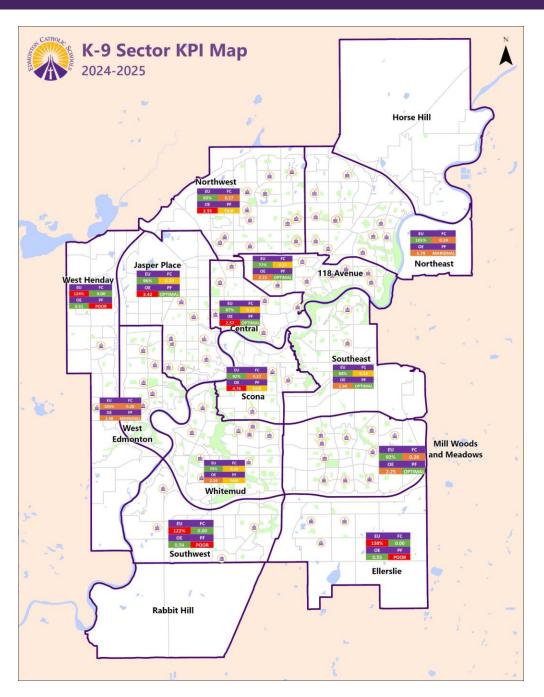

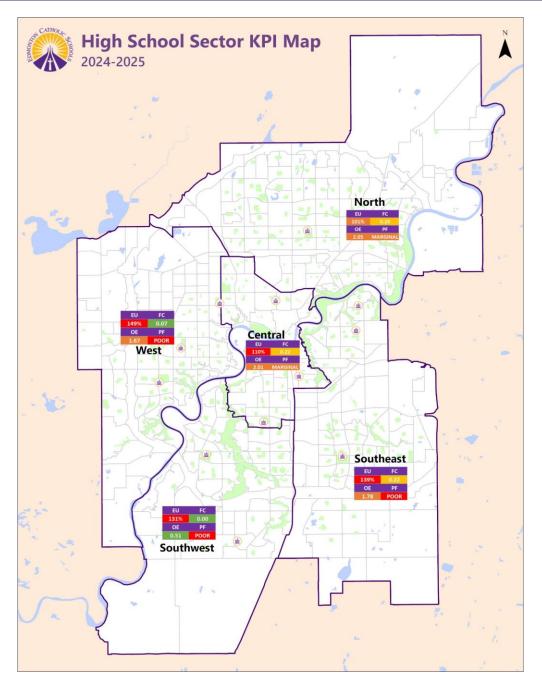

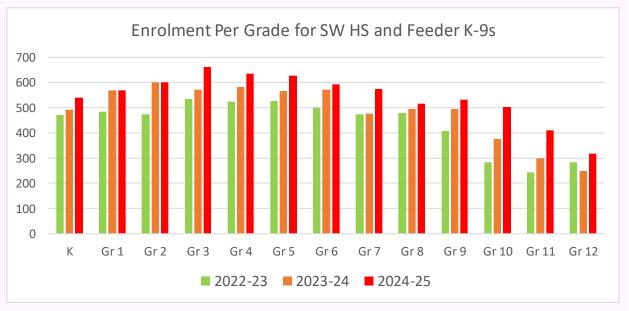

1) Enrolment Pressures in the Southwest

The data reveals a significant wave of growth in student enrolment, with the peak occurring in Grade 3. Each cohort is experiencing an average 10% increase in enrolment each year as they move up through the grades. Additionally, same grade growth averages 13% year on year. Notably, Grade 10 enrolment surged by 33% due to the opening of Father Michael McCaffery Catholic High School, further emphasizing the increasing demand at the high school level.

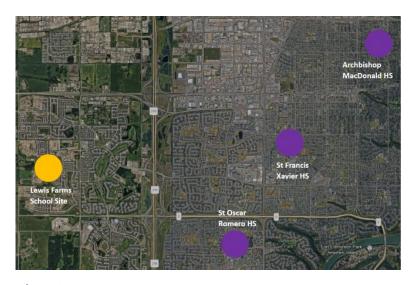
This growth is expected to continue as the current Grade 3 cohort progresses through the system, with projections indicating a sustained rise in student numbers, especially in high school, over the next 6-10 years. The current Grade 3 class will take approximately 6 years to reach high school and



10 years to graduate, meaning the system will experience increasing pressure over an extended period. Long-term planning will be crucial to accommodate this growth, particularly at the high school level, where enrolment is expected to continue expanding, requiring additional infrastructure and resources to manage the influx of students. The "wave" of increasing enrolment is expected to continue, making it clear that this growth trend will be felt for many years to come.

- The West HS Sector is significantly growing with **5,512 houses built** in the last five years. The sector is only **58% built out** and is expected to see substantial development over the next few years, especially to the South of the West Henday district.

Community Building:

• The Lewis Farms Catholic High School will be an integral community hub for the West HS Planning Sector. The school will be lo cated next to the City of Edmonton's Lewis Farms Recreation Centre that is currently under construction and has the potential to be nefit from an enhanced access partnership with the City of Edmonton. Transportation accessibility for students and the community will also be enhanced by the Valley Line West LRT that is currently under construction.

All high schools in the West HS Sector are already at full capacity. The sector will be 149% utilized in five years. A new high school in Lewis Farms is needed to reduce enrolment pressures in West Edmonton and throughout the Division.

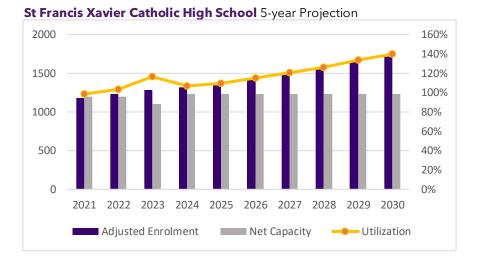

Rationale:

Enrolment Pressure:

- The Northwest Sector currently has a mix of overutilized and underutilized small schools with growth limited by inefficient locations and small capacities.
- Goodridge Corners, the future community north of Anthony Henday has already started the process for land development. This neighbourhood will see around 4,000 residential units and will add significant pressures on existing schools.

Program Functionality:

- The project will provide **equity of access to Catholic junior high programming** across the sector which is currently lacking in the northern part of the sector.
- The project will provide **operational efficiencies** by bringing the students from older, smaller schools into modern facilities that will feature a **better learning environment**, **enhanced program options**, **and improved recreational amenities**.

Building Condition:

- Katherine Therrien and St. Charles Catholic schools have some of the Division's highest Facility Condition Index (FCI) with a "Poor" FCI of 0.41.
- The five-year maintenance requirements of these schools total \$11.67 Million including a deferred maintenance cost of over \$3.14 Million.
- The VFA Report of these schools indicate multiple systems as "Marginal" including building envelope, fire safety, air handling units, interiors, sanitary sewage collection, insulation, accessibility, site grading, etc.

Operational Efficiency:

• Addressing the deficiencies will result in streamlined operations that will bring cost savings not only in maintenance liabilities but also in the form of lower administration, transportation, maintenance, custodial, utilities and insurance costs.

The Government of Alberta and ECSD will immediately save \$11.67 Million in maintenance costs, and \$3.14 Million deferred maintenance costs, as well as upcoming lifecycle costs associated with these aging schools.

Accommodation Strategy:

• School Accommodation Plan: The existing schools will continue to operate until any replacement school construction is complete.

Risk of non-approval:

- Schools will continue to operate inefficiently resulting in prolonged financial deficit and increasing maintenance costs.
- Aging school infrastructure will continue to deteriorate which could lead to health and safety issues.
- Approval delay will result in continued inequity in accessing Catholic junior high programming in the Northwest sector.

Rationale:

Health, Safety and Legal:

• The replacement project will address the **Health, Safety and Legal** issues of operating and maintaining 70+ year old schools and provide **operational efficiencies** in a new facility that will feature a **better learning environment**, **enhanced program options**, **and improved amenities**.

Enrolment Pressure:

• The 118 Avenue Sector currently at an optimal **84% utilization.** However, this is an average of an imbalance of utilization between individual schools such as St. Alphonsus at 64% utilization and St. Gerard at 104%. A replacement school would result in a balanced and more efficient utilization.

Community Renewal:

• The school serves some of the most marginalized and socially vulnerable populations in the city. A new school with modern amenities would revitalize the community and pave the way for a positive generational impact for the families it serves.

Building Condition:

- St. Alphonsus Catholic Elementary/Junior High School is 76 years old with an FCI of 0.29. The layout is inefficient with very poor accessibility that does not meet legal obligations under the latest building codes in effect.
- **St. Gerard Catholic Elementary School** is **72 years old** with an FCI of **0.28**. Recent building assessments have revealed that several building systems, including key structural components, are reaching the end of their life cycle. This presents an imminent Health & Safety concern and will require substantial investments, in addition to the already rising maintenance costs.
- The five-year maintenance requirements of the current schools total \$13.5 Million including a deferred maintenance cost of over \$3.6 Million.
- The VFA Report of the current school indicate multiple systems as "Marginal" including building envelope, building systems controls, interiors, sanitary sewage collection, insulation, accessibility, site infrastructure, etc.

Operational Efficiency:

- By replacing these 70+ year old schools into a 905 capacity K-9 school, the **Government of Alberta will be saving approximately 38% in Operations & Maintenance (O&M)** Funding using the O&M funding formula in Alberta Education's Funding Manual for 2024-25.
- While ECSD is expected to receive slightly lower O&M funding, operational savings from a more optimally utilized new facility will significantly outweigh this funding decline.

The Government of Alberta and ECSD will immediately save \$13.5 Million in maintenance costs, and \$3.6 Million deferred maintenance costs, as well as upcoming lifecycle costs associated with these three aging schools. These savings in IMR/CMR costs would offset at least 35% of the project cost.

Accommodation Strategy:

- St. Alphonsus Catholic School Accommodation Plan: A replacement school will be planned for the same site as the current St. Alphonsus Catholic School. For safety and project efficiency, students from St. Alphonsus Catholic School may temporarily relocate to St. Bernadette Catholic Elementary and St. Nicholas Catholic Junior High Schools when the new Rundle Heights school is finished, until the replacement school is completed.
- **Value Scoping:** Alberta Education in collaboration with ECSD and Alberta Infrastructure conducted a value scoping session in March 2018 to evaluate options and assist in the Division in determining a solution that offers the best value for capital funding that meets the long-term educational needs of the community.

Risk of non-approval:

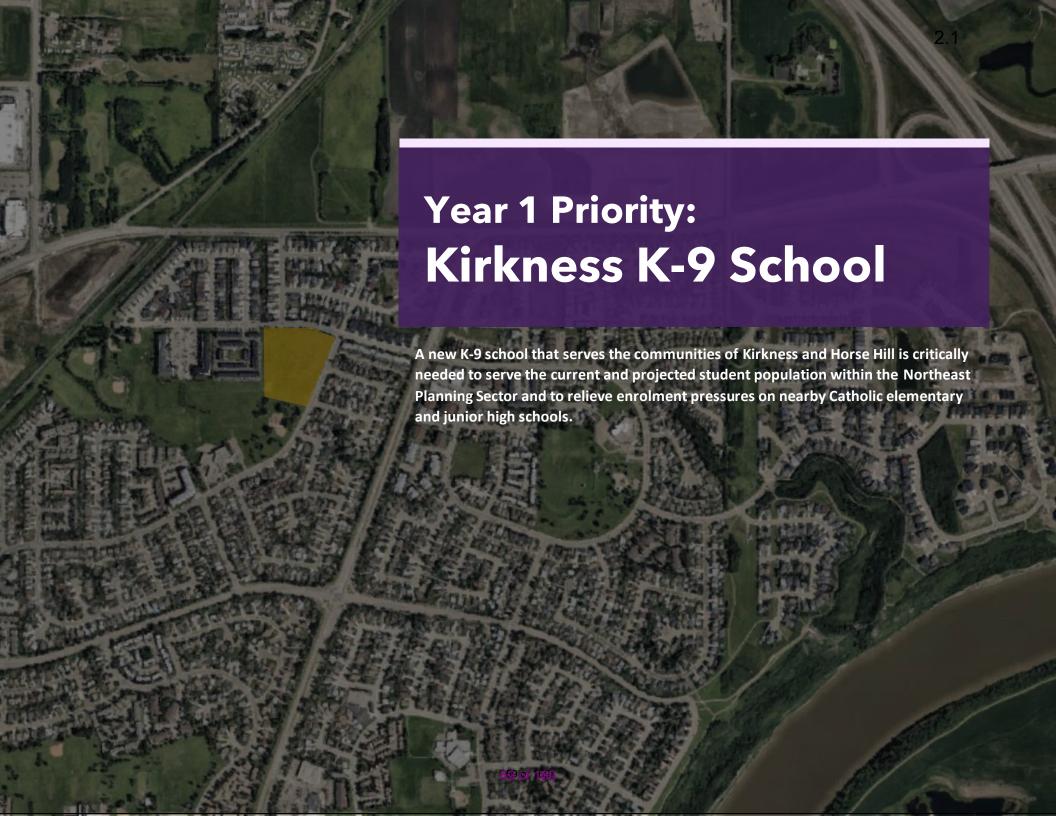

Rationale:

Enrolment Pressure:

- A new K-9 Catholic School that serves the communities in the Kirkness and Horse Hill area is needed to serve the current and future student population in the Northeast Planning Sector and relieve enrolment pressures on existing Catholic elementary and junior high schools in the sector.
- The Northeast Sector is one of the fastest growing areas in the City of Edmonton, with **2,490 houses built in the last five years**. The sector is 93% built out and Horse Hill, which is largely undeveloped, is expected to see substantial development over the next few years.
- Even with the opening of the Crystallina Nera Catholic Elementary/Junior High School in 2028, the Northeast planning sector will still be **over 100% utilized**. With **Kirkness K-9 approved, utilization would improve to an optimal 88% utilization**.

St Elizabeth Seton Catholic School will be nearly 133% utilized in three years. A new school in Kirkness is urgently needed to reduce enrolment pressures in Northeast Edmonton.

Community Building:

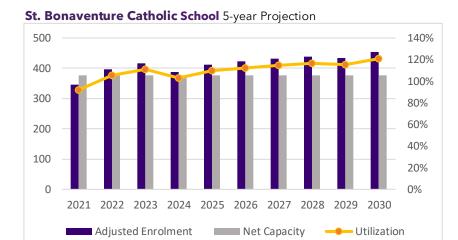
• The Horse Hill district is currently underserved with no Catholic school in the area north of Anthony Henday. A new Catholic school, conveniently accessible via Manning Drive, will help address this gap.

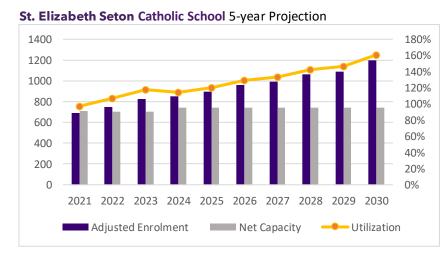
Impacts on Existing Schools:

- **K-6 students** residing in the proposed attendance area for this school attend St. Bonaventure Catholic Elementary School, which is operating at full capacity.
 - St. Bonaventure Catholic Elementary School current utilization is 103% and expected to increase to 116% in three years.
- **Gr 7-9 students** residing in the proposed attendance area for this school attend St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic Elementary/Junior High School, which is operating at full capacity despite the addition of new modulars under MCP 2024.
 - St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic Elementary/Junior High School current utilization is 115% and expected to increase to 143% in three years and 161% in five years.

Accommodation Strategy in the Northeast:

- **Modular Classrooms:** Both St. Elizabeth Seton Elementary/Junior High and St. Bonaventure Catholic Elementary Schools have reached the maximum capacity for modulars. As the surrounding neighbourhoods including Horse Hill continue to develop, both schools will face mounting enrolment pressures.
- Other K-9 schools within the Northeast Sector cannot accommodate additional student growth.
- **Program Changes/Relocation:** In 2019, 100 Voices/Pre-Kindergarten program at Christ the King Catholic Elementary/Junior High School was removed. In 2021, the Out of School Care lease was terminated to make more room for instructional space. These changes had no impact on utilization and enrolment increased by 23% over the last two years.





• **Boundary Changes:** In 2020/21 school year, the Division redesignated the communities of Crystallina Nera (East and West) and Schonsee to St. John Bosco Catholic Elementary School for Grades K-6 and J.J. Bowlen Catholic Junior High School for Grades 7-9. The boundary changes did not have a significant impact on Christ the King Catholic Elementary/Junior High School and in 2024, Kindergarten students were redesignated to Anne Fitzgerald Elementary School.

Risk of non-approval:

- If Kirkness is not approved, St. Bonaventure Elementary School and St. Elizabeth Seton will become severely over-utilized (116% and 143% utilized respectively in three years) and face immense enrolment pressures.
- Without a new school, **ECSD** will not be able to effectively provide Catholic education in the rapidly growing Northeast and Horse Hill districts.

Background:

The Edmonton Catholic School Division (ECSD) conducted the ECSD Annual Survey from November 25, 2024, to January 10, 2025, to engage stakeholders with respect to the quality of Catholic education provided. The survey items were developed during the 2023/2024 school year to reflect the *Alberta Education Assurance Framework* as well as the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth (2023-2026)*.

The following groups were surveyed:

- students in grades 4 to 6,
- students in grades 7 to 9,
- students in grades 10 to 12,
- parents/guardians of all students, and
- certificated teachers.

The attached ECSD Annual Survey Results Report provides Division results for each of the respondent groups for the 2024/2025 survey administration. Division results will be available on the Division Assurance Dashboard located on the Division public website. In addition to the Division results, individual school reports will also be available to each school Principal. The school reports are used by school staff and School Councils in preparing and adjusting their *School Plan for Continuous Growth*. School results will also be available on the School Assurance Dashboards located on the school public websites.

Recommendation:

That based on the evidence provided in the ECSD Annual Survey Results Report 2024/2025, the Board of Trustees determines that the following Quality Indicators have been met, as per *Board Policy 12 - Appendix B*, relative to the current evaluation period:

EDMONTON CATHOLIC SCHOOLS ECSD ANNUAL SURVEY RESULTS 2024/2025 SCHOOL YEAR

I. INTRODUCTION

The Edmonton Catholic School Division (ECSD) conducted the ECSD Annual Survey from November 25, 2024 to January 10, 2025, to engage students, parents/guardians, and certificated teachers with respect to the quality of Catholic education provided. The survey items were developed during the 2023/2024 school year to reflect the *Alberta Education Assurance Framework* as well as the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026*. Students, certificated teachers, as well as parents/guardians of students currently enrolled in Edmonton Catholic Schools were invited to participate in the survey.

Five separate survey instruments were administered including one for:

- students in grades 4 to 6;
- students in grades 7 to 9;
- students in grades 10 to 12;
- parents/guardians of all students; and
- · certificated teachers.

The ECSD Annual Survey was conducted using paper surveys. As paper surveys were administered, survey responses were voluntary and anonymous. Each survey consisted of a series of statements with which respondents from the survey groups were asked to indicate their level of agreement.

- For all students in grades 4 to 12, parents/guardians of all students, as well as certificated teachers, the analysis was based on a four-point scale ("Strongly Disagree", "Disagree", "Agree", and "Strongly Agree").
- A few demographic items also appeared on the surveys.

This report provides the Division results for each of the respondent survey groups for the 2024/2025 survey administration. Division results will be available on the Division Assurance Dashboard located on the Division public website. In addition to the Division results, individual school reports will also be available to each school Principal. The school reports are used by school staff and School Councils in preparing and adjusting their *School Plan for Continuous Growth*. School results will also be available on the School Assurance Dashboards located on the school public websites. Consistent with past methodology, results with fewer than six respondents are not reported to protect the identity of small groups.

Events occurred during the 2024/2025 survey administration timeframe that may have affected survey results and response rates. The Canada Post strike began on November 15, 2024, and was suspended on December 17, 2024. During the 2023/2024 survey administration, the Division mailed the parent/guardian surveys directly to the parents/guardians of high school students. However, due to the Canada Post strike during the 2024/2025 survey administration, high schools had to ask their students to bring the parent/guardian surveys home to their parents/guardians instead, which may have affected response rates.

In addition, during the 2023/2024 survey administration, parents/guardians were able to return their completed surveys directly to the Division through Canada Post business reply mail. Due to the Canada Post strike during the 2024/2025 survey administration, parents/guardians were encouraged to return their completed surveys directly to their child's school instead, which may have also affected survey results and response rates.

Strikes of School Support Staff from various school divisions in Alberta may have also affected the results of the survey as the education sector provincially was experiencing unrest. Another event that may have affected survey results during the 2024/2025 survey administration was the cybersecurity PowerSchool breach. PowerSchool is the student information system that is used by Edmonton Catholic Schools and many other school divisions worldwide. PowerSchool was made aware of a cybersecurity incident on December 28, 2024, and notified ECSD on January 7, 2025. ECSD notified staff, families, and the public on January 8, 2025, about the cybersecurity incident which may have affected survey results as all families and all certificated teachers with PowerSchool access were affected. Additional communications were also provided.

As the survey items were newly developed during the 2023/2024 school year, the results are not comparable to previous surveys conducted in prior years. Due to the events stated above and due to survey item alignment changes for the priorities in the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026*, caution should be used in comparing the results for the 2024/2025 school year to the 2023/2024 school year.

II. TARGET POPULATION AND RESPONSE RATES

The numbers of Division surveys expected and received are as follows:

Surveys were administered to parents/guardians of all students currently enrolled in the Division (100 Voices through to 4th and 5th Year High School students). Surveys were also administered to all certificated teachers and all students in grades 4 to 12 (including 4th and 5th Year High School) within schools in the Division. As one school had only early learning enrolments, their students were not surveyed; however, parents/guardians and certificated teachers from this school were included in the target population.

There were three items with respect to career decisions, selecting courses to prepare for life after Grade 12, and senior high school diplomas or certificates that appeared on the grades 7 to 9, grades 10 to 12, and parent/guardian surveys. The three items on the parent/guardian survey were only for parents/guardians of grade 9 students or high school students. Parents/guardians of these students were asked to complete the three items and parents/guardians of students in grade 8 or younger were asked to leave these items blank. The three items on the grades 7 to 9 survey were only for grade 9 students. Grade 9 students were asked to complete the three items and grades 7 and 8 students were asked to leave these items blank. The three items also appeared on the grades 10 to 12 survey and all students in grades 10 to 12 were asked to complete the items.

III. Presentation of Results

The results for each survey group are provided in the appendices for both response percentages and dichotomous percentages. In this report, dichotomous results are presented in respect to measures by themes and through data visualization charts.

In **Appendix A**, the **response percentages** are provided.

- These tables provide the percentages responding to the **actual scales** used in the survey.
- Overall, Appendix A provides **detailed** information in assessing the responses.

In **Appendix B**, the **dichotomous percentages** are provided.

- For the purposes of these tables, the upper scale values ("Strongly Agree" and "Agree") as well as the lower scale values ("Strongly Disagree" and "Disagree") were aggregated.
- As a result, the tables reflect a two-point scale ("Agreement" and "Disagreement").
- Overall, Appendix B reflects global information that is comparable across the five survey groups. The aggregation also serves to make the Division's results more comparable to Alberta Education's results.

In **Appendix C**, the overall agreement **dichotomous percentages** are presented in the charts.

IV. MEASURES BY THEMES

In this section, the survey items are organized by themes using the dichotomous percentages. Dichotomous results reflect overall agreement and disagreement. At the end of each theme, a chart is provided for students (grades 4 to 12 combined), parents/guardians, and certificated teachers. The percentages recorded in the charts are weighted averages. The themes also reflect the Division priorities as identified in the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026* as well as the domains associated with the *Alberta Education Assurance Framework*.

1. CATHOLIC IDENTITY — REFLECTS THE DIVISION PRIORITY "LIVING OUR FAITH" AND THE ALBERTA EDUCATION DOMAIN "LOCAL AND SOCIETAL CONTEXT"

In considering the **grades 4 to 6** students, results indicated that:

- **98.6%** indicated that they have religious celebrations at their school throughout the school year;
- 97.6% indicated that they pray regularly at their school;
- 97.6% agreed that their school teaches them about the Catholic faith;
- **95.0%** indicated that they participate in social justice activities at their school that help the community (e.g., Food Bank, Terry Fox Run); and
- 86.0% agreed that their teachers talk about Catholic values in many subject areas.

In considering the grades 7 to 9 students, results indicated that:

- **97.6%** indicated that they have religious celebrations at their school throughout the school year;
- 97.3% indicated that they pray regularly at their school;
- 96.2% agreed that their school teaches them about the Catholic faith;
- **88.8%** indicated that they participate in social justice activities at their school that help the community (e.g., Food Bank, Terry Fox Run); and
- 76.7% agreed that their teachers talk about Catholic values in many subject areas.

In considering the grades 10 to 12 students, results indicated that:

- **95.7**% indicated that they have religious celebrations at their school throughout the school year;
- 95.6% indicated that they pray regularly at their school;
- 92.2% agreed that their school teaches them about the Catholic faith;
- **70.5**% indicated that they participate in social justice activities at their school that help the community (e.g., Food Bank, Terry Fox Run); and
- 67.2% agreed that their teachers talk about Catholic values in many subject areas.

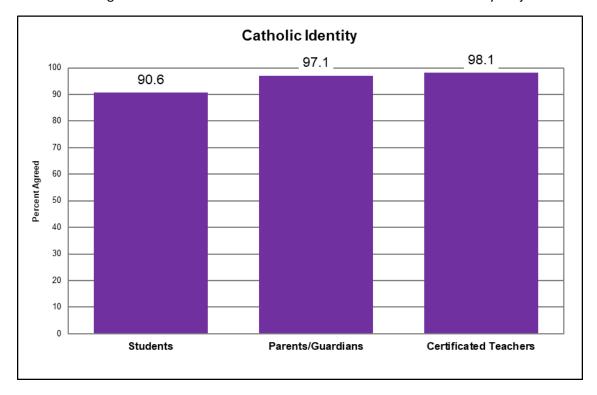
In considering the **parents/guardians**, results indicated that:

- **98.2**% indicated that their child's school has religious celebrations throughout the school year;
- 98.0% indicated that their child has the opportunity to pray regularly at school;
- **97.5%** agreed that their child's school creates and promotes a learning environment that is grounded in the Catholic faith;

- 97.4% indicated that their child participates in social justice activities at their school that help the community (e.g., Food Bank, Terry Fox Run); and
- 94.3% agreed that teachers at their child's school infuse Catholic values in many subject areas.

In considering the **certificated teachers**, results indicated that:

- **99.2%** indicated that they have religious celebrations at their school throughout the school year;
- 98.9% indicated that students have the opportunity to pray regularly at their school;
- **98.3%** indicated that students participate in social justice activities at their school that help the community (e.g., Food Bank, Terry Fox Run);
- 98.2% agreed that their school creates and promotes a learning environment that is grounded in the Catholic faith; and
- 95.8% agreed that teachers at their school infuse Catholic values in many subject areas.



For the 2024/2025 school year, the results for the Catholic Identity theme are provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the results for the Catholic Identity theme were 92.3% for students, 96.6% for parents/guardians, and 98.0% for certificated teachers. It is important to note that the survey items associated with social justice activities were moved from the Student Engagement theme to the Catholic Identity theme for this school year. In recalculating the 2023/2024 results by adding the survey items associated with social justice activities, the recalculated results would be 91.1% for students, 96.6% for parents/guardians, and 98.1% for certificated teachers for the Catholic Identity theme. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

2. WELLNESS – REFLECTS THE DIVISION PRIORITY "LIVING OUR FAITH" AND THE ALBERTA EDUCATION DOMAIN "LOCAL AND SOCIETAL CONTEXT"

In considering the **grades 4 to 6** students, results indicated that:

- **94.0%** agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about physical wellness:
- **91.0%** agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about mental wellness; and
- **88.1**% agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about spiritual wellness.

In considering the **grades 7 to 9** students, results indicated that:

- **90.8%** agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about physical wellness;
- **84.9%** agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about mental wellness; and
- **78.4**% agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about spiritual wellness.

In considering the grades 10 to 12 students, results indicated that:

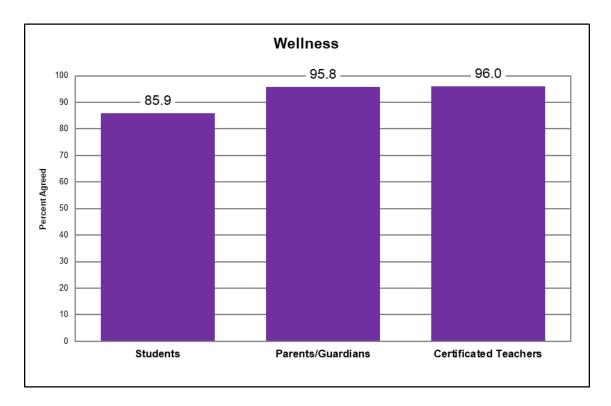
- **87.7**% agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about physical wellness;
- **79.2%** agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about mental wellness; and
- **76.0%** agreed that their school provides them with opportunities to learn about spiritual wellness.

In considering the parents/guardians, results indicated that:

- **96.9%** agreed that their child's school provides their child with opportunities to learn about physical wellness;
- **96.1%** agreed that their child's school provides their child with opportunities to learn about spiritual wellness; and
- **94.5%** agreed that their child's school provides their child with opportunities to learn about mental wellness.

In considering the **certificated teachers**, results indicated that:

- **97.3%** agreed that their school provides students with opportunities to learn about physical wellness;
- **95.9**% agreed that their school provides students with opportunities to learn about mental wellness; and
- **94.7**% agreed that their school provides students with opportunities to learn about spiritual wellness.



For the 2024/2025 school year, the results for the Wellness theme are provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the results for the Wellness theme were 86.6% for students, 95.2% for parents/guardians, and 95.2% for certificated teachers. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

3. Inclusive and Caring Learning Environment – Reflects the Division Priority "Embracing Diversity" and the Alberta Education Domain "Learning Supports"

In considering the **grades 4 to 6** students, results indicated that:

- 95.6% indicated that welcoming and including others is an expectation at their school;
- **95.3%** indicated that their school teaches them to show respect for people of all different faiths, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences;
- 94.8% agreed that they demonstrate care for others at their school; and
- **90.4%** indicated that their school celebrates diversity by having events and activities that highlight different cultures and backgrounds.

In considering the grades 7 to 9 students, results indicated that:

- 90.8% agreed that they demonstrate care for others at their school;
- 90.7% indicated that welcoming and including others is an expectation at their school;
- **90.6%** indicated that their school teaches them to show respect for people of all different faiths, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences; and
- **82.1%** indicated that their school celebrates diversity by having events and activities that highlight different cultures and backgrounds.

In considering the **grades 10 to 12** students, results indicated that:

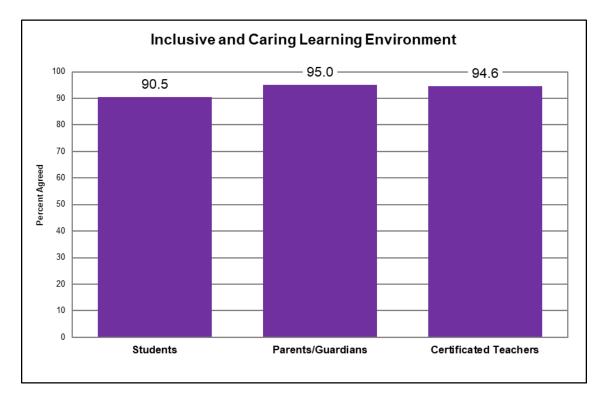
- **90.2%** indicated that their school teaches them to show respect for people of all different faiths, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences;
- 89.5% agreed that they demonstrate care for others at their school;
- 88.6% indicated that welcoming and including others is an expectation at their school;
 and
- **85.9%** indicated that their school celebrates diversity by having events and activities that highlight different cultures and backgrounds.

In considering the parents/guardians, results indicated that:

- 97.5% indicated that their child's school teaches their child to show respect for people of all different faiths, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences;
- 96.4% indicated that welcoming and including others is an expectation at their child's school:
- 93.6% indicated that their child's school celebrates diversity by having events and activities that highlight different cultures and backgrounds; and
- 92.4% agreed that students at their child's school demonstrate care for each other.

In considering the **certificated teachers**, results indicated that:

- 97.0% indicated that welcoming and including others is an expectation at their school;
- **96.7**% indicated that their school teaches students to show respect for people of all different faiths, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences;
- **92.8%** indicated that their school celebrates diversity by having events and activities that highlight different cultures and backgrounds; and
- **92.0%** agreed that students at their school demonstrate care for each other.



For the 2024/2025 school year, the results for the Inclusive and Caring Learning Environment theme are provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the results for the Inclusive and Caring Learning Environment theme were 90.4% for students, 94.1% for parents/guardians, and 94.0% for certificated teachers. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

4. FOUNDATIONAL KNOWLEDGE ABOUT FIRST NATIONS, METIS, AND INUIT – REFLECTS THE DIVISION PRIORITY "ORGANIZATIONAL EXCELLENCE" AND THE ALBERTA EDUCATION DOMAIN "STUDENT GROWTH AND ACHIEVEMENT"

In considering the **grades 4 to 6** students, results indicated that:

• **96.5%** indicated that they learn about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit culture, history, perspectives, and experiences at their school.

In considering the **grades 7 to 9** students, results indicated that:

• **93.0%** indicated that they learn about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit culture, history, perspectives, and experiences at their school.

In considering the **grades 10 to 12** students, results indicated that:

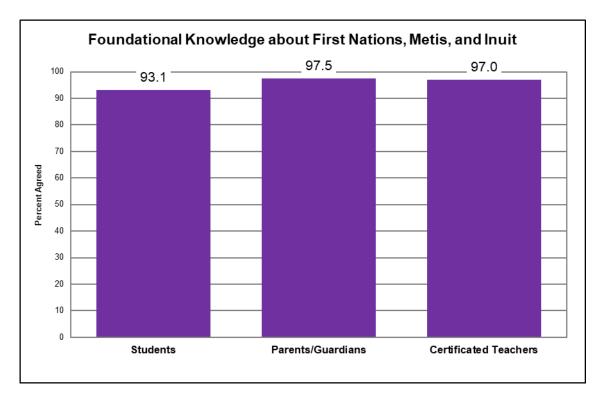
• **88.9%** indicated that they learn about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit culture, history, perspectives, and experiences at their school.

In considering the **parents/guardians**, results indicated that:

• **97.5**% indicated that their child's school teaches about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit culture, history, perspectives, and experiences.

In considering the **certificated teachers**, results indicated that:

- 97.3% indicated that their school teaches about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit culture, history, perspectives, and experiences; and
- **96.6%** indicated that their school is working to advance the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action in the school and community.



For the 2024/2025 school year, the results for the Foundational Knowledge about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit theme are provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the results for the Foundational Knowledge about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit theme were 93.5% for students, 97.0% for parents/guardians, and 96.6% for certificated teachers. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

5. Access to Help, Support, and Resources – Reflects the Division Priority "Learning Excellence" and the Alberta Education Domain "Learning Supports"

In considering the **grades 4 to 6** students, results indicated that:

- 92.5% agreed that their school has a variety of extra-curricular activities, clubs, and/or teams; and
- **87.1%** agreed that there are staff members available if they need extra help with their learning.

In considering the **grades 7 to 9** students, results indicated that:

- **92.7%** agreed that their school has a variety of extra-curricular activities, clubs, and/or teams:
- **83.0%** agreed that there are staff members available if they need extra help with their learning;
- 75.9% indicated that as a Grade 9 student, their school provides resources and access to help so that they know what they need to do to receive a senior high school diploma or certificate;
- **66.5**% indicated that as a Grade 9 student, their school provides resources and opportunities to help them make career decisions; and
- **63.4%** indicated that as a Grade 9 student, their school provides resources and access to help in selecting courses to prepare for life after Grade 12.

In considering the **grades 10 to 12** students, results indicated that:

- **91.9%** agreed that their school has a variety of extra-curricular activities, clubs, and/or teams;
- **90.0**% indicated that their school provides resources and access to help so that they know what they need to do to receive a senior high school diploma or certificate;
- **87.0**% agreed that there are staff members available if they need extra help with their learning;
- **84.2**% indicated that their school provides resources and opportunities to help them make career decisions; and
- **84.1%** indicated that their school provides resources and access to help in selecting courses to prepare for life after Grade 12.

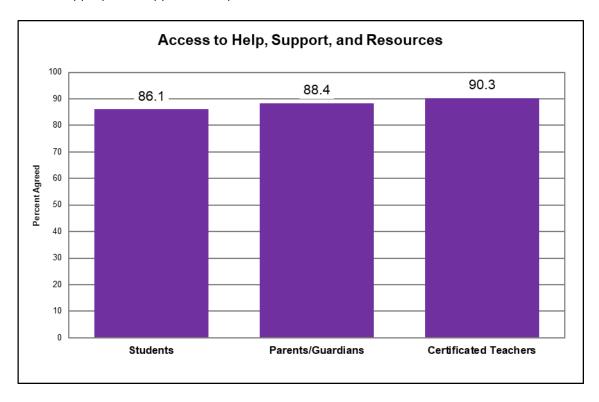
In considering the parents/guardians, results indicated that:

- **91.4%** agreed that their child has access to appropriate academic supports and specialized services when needed;
- **90.4%** indicated that their child in Grade 9, 10, 11, 12, or 4th or 5th Year High School is provided with resources and access to help so that they know what they need to do to receive a senior high school diploma or certificate;
- **87.7**% agreed that their child has access to supports and specialized services to meet their non-academic, social-emotional, and mental health needs;
- **87.0%** indicated that their child in Grade 9, 10, 11, 12, or 4th or 5th Year High School has access to help in selecting courses to prepare for life after Grade 12;

- **86.6%** indicated that their child in Grade 9, 10, 11, 12, or 4th or 5th Year High School has resources available to help them make career decisions; and
- **86.1**% agreed that their child's school has a variety of extra-curricular activities, clubs, and/or teams.

In considering the **certificated teachers**, results indicated that:

- **96.3**% agreed that their school has a variety of extra-curricular activities, clubs, and/or teams;
- **90.6%** agreed that their school offers supports and specialized services to meet the non-academic, social-emotional, and mental health needs of students;
- **89.6%** agreed that their school provides academic supports and specialized services when students need them; and
- **84.7**% agreed that students with special needs at their school have access to appropriate supports and specialized services.



For the 2024/2025 school year, the results for the Access to Help, Support, and Resources theme are provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the results for the Access to Help, Support, and Resources theme were 86.8% for students, 87.6% for parents/guardians, and 91.3% for certificated teachers. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

- 91.0% agreed that they can make choices about how to demonstrate their learning;
- 87.4% indicated that their opinions are respected and valued by the staff at their school;
 and
- **79.0%** indicated that they have opportunities to share their opinions about their school with school staff.

In considering the **grades 7 to 9** students, results indicated that:

- 81.9% agreed that they can make choices about how to demonstrate their learning;
- **77.0%** indicated that their opinions are respected and valued by the staff at their school; and
- **66.3%** indicated that they have opportunities to share their opinions about their school with school staff.

In considering the **grades 10 to 12** students, results indicated that:

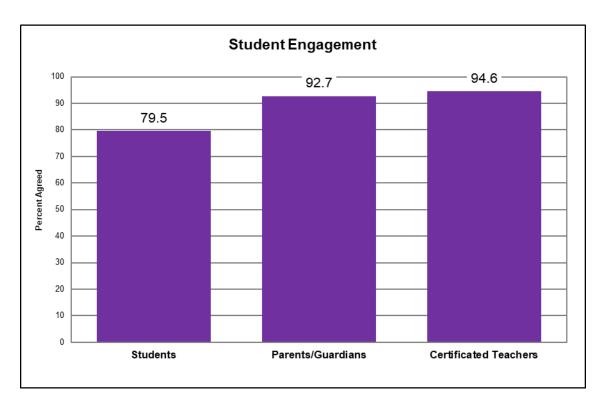

It is important to note that the survey items associated with social justice activities were moved from the Student Engagement theme to the Catholic Identity theme for this school year. In recalculating the 2023/2024 results by removing the survey items associated with social justice activities, the recalculated results would be 80.4% for students, 91.6% for parents/guardians, and 93.6% for certificated teachers for the Student Engagement theme. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

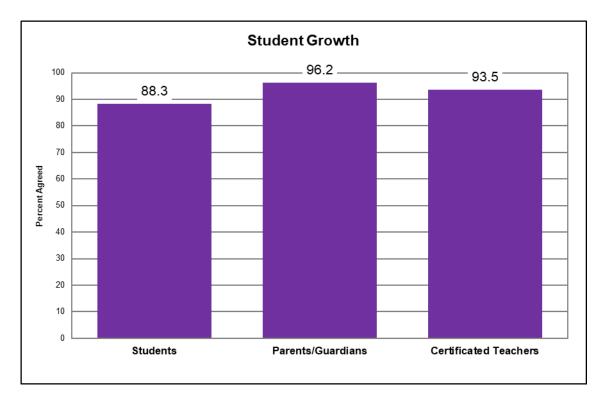
- 85.3% agreed that they are growing their reading and writing skills; and

- 89.9% agreed that their teachers encourage them to try their best;
- **88.9%** agreed that they are given examples of what is expected of them in their assignments;
- **80.0%** indicated that their learning activities are engaging and relevant;
- **77.0%** agreed that they receive clear and specific feedback about their learning throughout the school year;
- 76.6% agreed that their teachers use a variety of approaches to meet their learning needs; and
- 76.6% agreed that they are taught how to use feedback in order to improve their learning.

In considering the **grades 10 to 12** students, results indicated that:

- 90.4% agreed that their teachers encourage them to try their best;
- 84.4% agreed that they are given examples of what is expected of them in their assignments;

- **73.7**% agreed that their teachers use a variety of approaches to meet their learning needs.

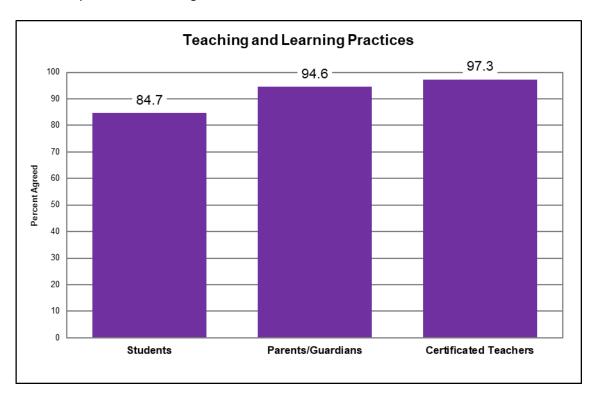

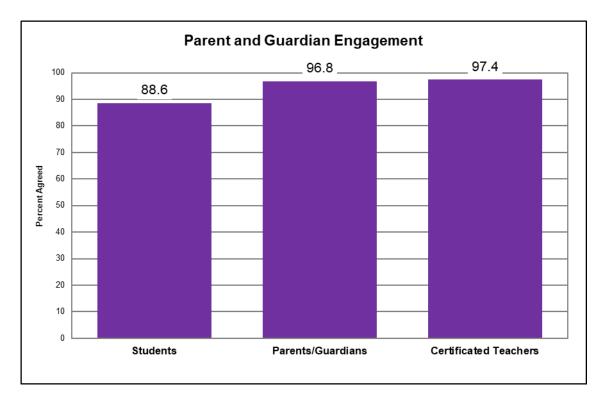

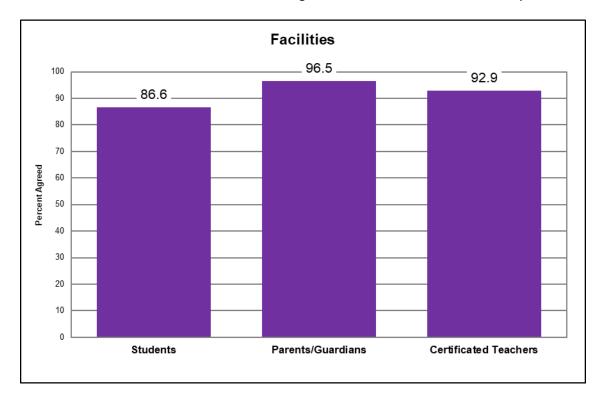

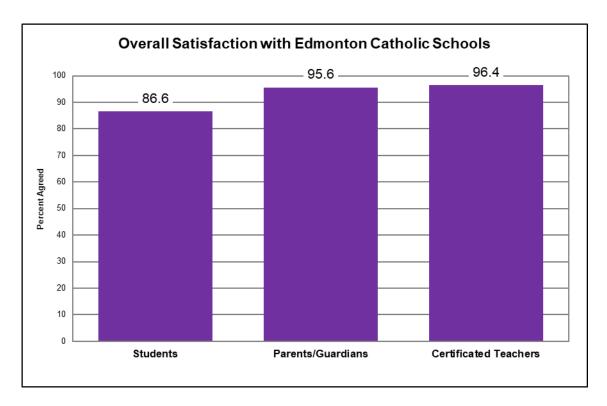
 Overall, 85.9% agreed that they are satisfied with the quality of education at their school.

V. COMMENTS

These results provide outcome measures necessary for Division assurance, information for setting priorities, identifying areas for growth, and recognizing areas of strength. A similar survey is planned for the 2025/2026 school year.

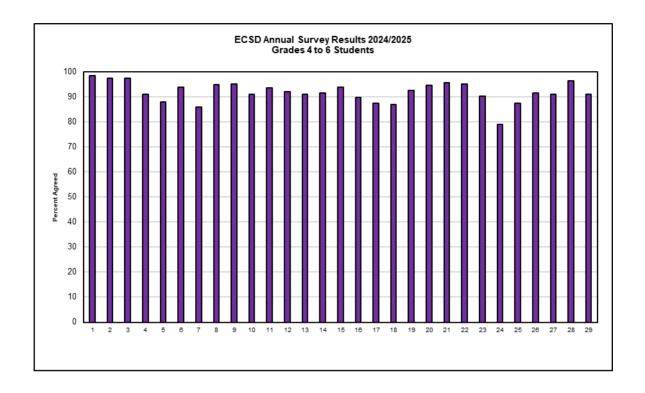

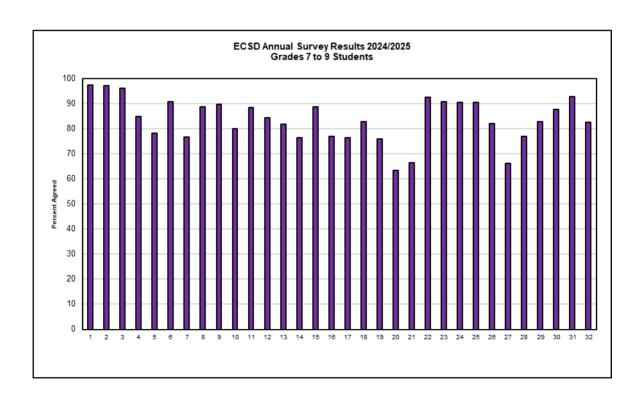

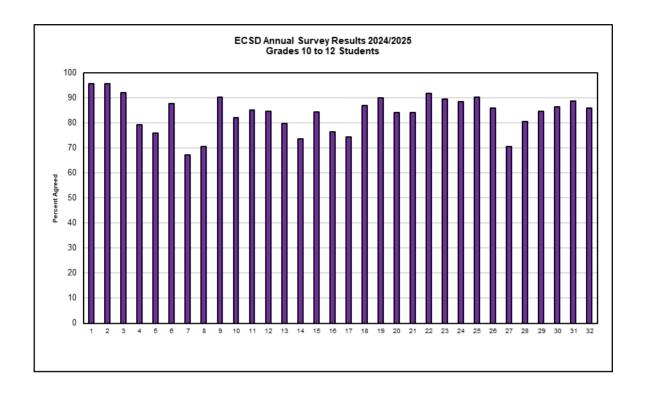
Chart: Grades 4 to 6 Students

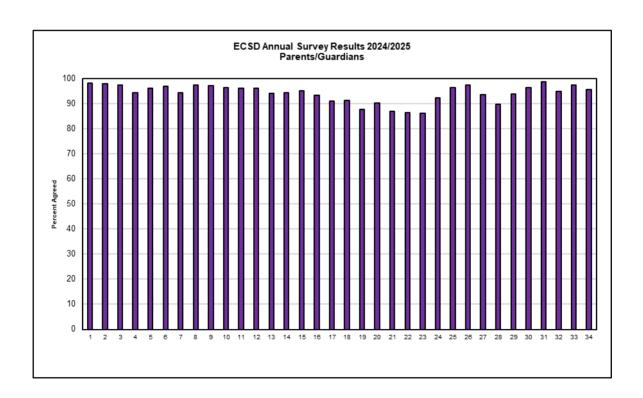

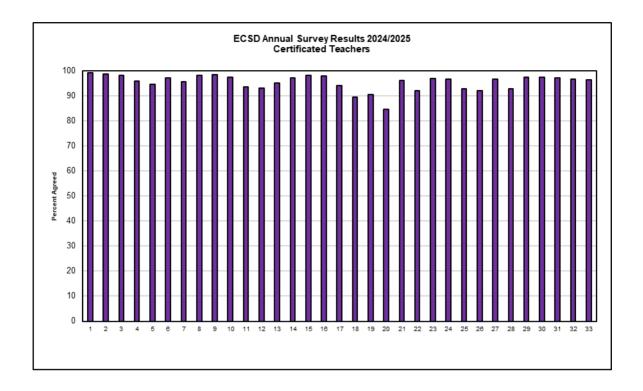

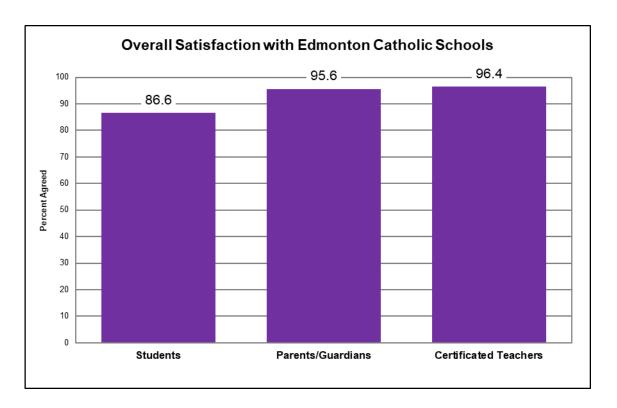

I. INTRODUCTION

The Edmonton Catholic School Division (ECSD) conducted the ECSD Systems Excellence Survey from January 6 to January 24, 2025, to engage Division staff with respect to their work and work environment. The survey items were developed during the 2023/2024 school year to reflect the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026*. Division staff from all schools and all departments were invited to participate in the survey.

The ECSD Systems Excellence Survey was conducted using paper surveys. As paper surveys were administered, survey responses were voluntary and anonymous. The survey consisted of a series of statements with which respondents were asked to indicate their level of agreement. The analysis was based on a four-point scale ("Strongly Disagree", "Disagree", "Agree", and "Strongly Agree").

This report provides the Division results for the 2024/2025 survey administration. In addition to the Division results, individual school reports will be provided to each school Principal and individual department reports will be provided to each department Superintendent. The school reports and department reports are used by leadership for planning purposes. Consistent with past methodology, results with fewer than six respondents are not reported to protect the identity of small groups.

Events occurred during the 2024/2025 survey administration timeframe that may have affected survey results and response rates. The Canada Post strike began on November 15, 2024, and was suspended on December 17, 2024. Consistent with the 2023/2024 survey administration, Division staff were given the option to return their completed surveys directly to the Division through Canada Post business reply mail during the 2024/2025 survey administration. However, upon resuming operations after the suspension of the strike, Canada Post indicated that delays in mail delivery could be expected into January 2025 which may have affected survey results and response rates.

In addition, strikes of School Support Staff from various school divisions in Alberta may have also affected the results of the survey as the education sector provincially was experiencing unrest. Another event that may have affected survey results during the 2024/2025 survey administration was the cybersecurity PowerSchool breach. PowerSchool is the student information system that is used by Edmonton Catholic Schools and many other school divisions worldwide. PowerSchool was made aware of a cybersecurity incident on December 28, 2024, and notified ECSD on January 7, 2025. ECSD notified staff, families, and the public on January 8, 2025, about the cybersecurity incident which may have affected survey results as all Division staff with PowerSchool access were affected. Additional communications were also provided.

As the survey items were newly developed during the 2023/2024 school year, the results are not comparable to previous surveys conducted in prior years. Due to the events stated above and due to survey item alignment changes for the priorities in the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026*, caution should be used in comparing the results for the 2024/2025 school year to the 2023/2024 school year.

II. TARGET POPULATION AND RESPONSE RATES

Surveys were distributed to Division staff from schools and departments. There were 4685 surveys distributed and 4055 surveys completed. Overall, the response rate for the 2024/2025 school year was **86.6%** for Division staff.

III. Presentation of Results

The results for Division staff are provided in the appendices for both response percentages and dichotomous percentages. In this report, dichotomous results are presented in respect to **measures by themes** and through **data visualization charts**.

In **Appendix A**, the **response percentages** are provided.

- This table provides the percentages responding to the actual scales used in the survey.
- Overall, Appendix A provides **detailed** information in assessing the responses.

In **Appendix B**, the **dichotomous percentages** are provided.

- For the purposes of this table, the upper scale values ("Strongly Agree" and "Agree") as well as the lower scale values ("Strongly Disagree" and "Disagree") were aggregated.
- As a result, the table reflects a **two-point scale** ("Agreement" and "Disagreement").
- Overall, Appendix B reflects **global** information. The aggregation also serves to make the Division's results more comparable to Alberta Education's results.

In Appendix C, the overall agreement dichotomous percentages are presented in the chart.

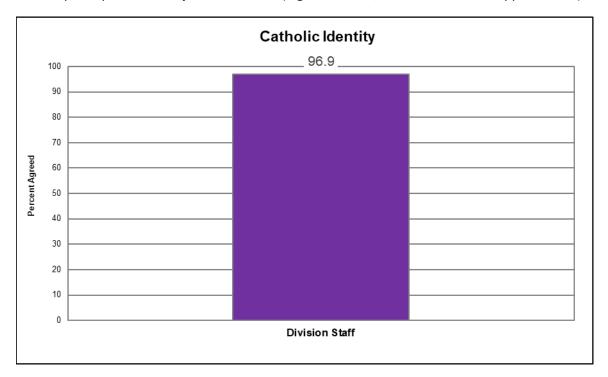
IV. MEASURES BY THEMES

In this section, the survey items are organized by themes using the dichotomous percentages. Dichotomous results reflect overall agreement and disagreement. At the end of each theme, a chart is provided for Division staff results. The percentages recorded in the charts are weighted averages. The themes also reflect the Division priorities as identified in the *Division Plan for Continuous Growth 2023-2026*.

1. CATHOLIC IDENTITY - REFLECTS THE DIVISION PRIORITY "LIVING OUR FAITH"

In considering the **Division staff**, results indicated that:

- **97.7**% indicated that they have opportunities to participate in religious celebrations at their school/department/site;
- 97.2% agreed that they have opportunities to pray regularly at their school/site;
- **97.0%** indicated that their school/department/site creates and promotes a working environment that is grounded in the Catholic faith; and
- **95.8%** indicated that their school/department/site provides them with opportunities to participate in social justice activities (e.g., donations, collections, service opportunities).

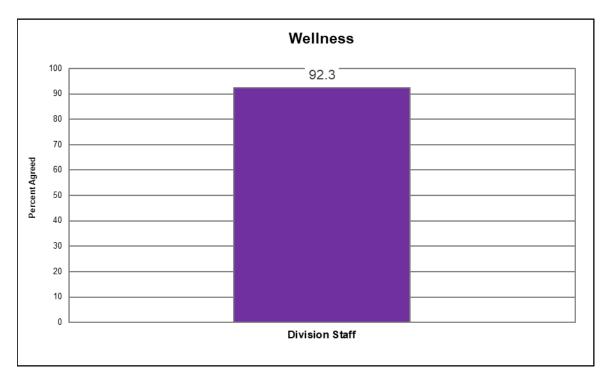


For the 2024/2025 school year, the result for the Catholic Identity theme is provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the result for the Catholic Identity theme was 97.6% for Division staff. It is important to note that the survey item associated with social justice activities was moved from the Staff Engagement theme to the Catholic Identity theme for this school year. In recalculating the 2023/2024 results by adding the survey item associated with social justice activities, the recalculated result would be 97.1% for Division staff for the Catholic Identity theme. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

2. WELLNESS - REFLECTS THE DIVISION PRIORITY "LIVING OUR FAITH"

In considering the **Division staff**, results indicated that:

- **95.5%** agreed that they have someone at their school/department that they can talk to if they feel like they need support;
- **95.1%** indicated that they know where to find the tools and resources provided by the Division to help them manage their wellness (e.g., Staff Wellness SharePoint site, Wellness Newsletter, Employee & Family Assistance Program);
- **91.2%** agreed that their school/site promotes a psychologically safe working environment; and
- 87.3% indicated that the tools and resources provided by the Division to help them manage their wellness are valuable to them (e.g., Staff Wellness SharePoint site, Wellness Newsletter, Employee & Family Assistance Program).

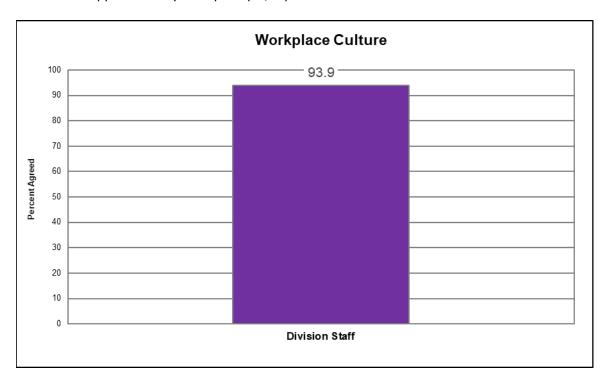


For the 2024/2025 school year, the result for the Wellness theme is provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the result for the Wellness theme was 91.7% for Division staff. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

3. Workplace Culture – Reflects the Division Priority "Embracing Diversity"

In considering the **Division staff**, results indicated that:

- **97.9%** agreed that their school/department expects staff to show respect for people of all faiths, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences;
- **95.2**% indicated that their school/department promotes an environment that is reflective of the Respect in the Workplace Administrative Procedure;
- **92.8**% agreed that they can go to their principal/supervisor if they feel like they need support;
- **92.6%** agreed that conflict management in their school/department is handled using a respectful approach; and
- **91.0%** indicated that their contributions to their school/department are acknowledged and appreciated by their principal/supervisor.

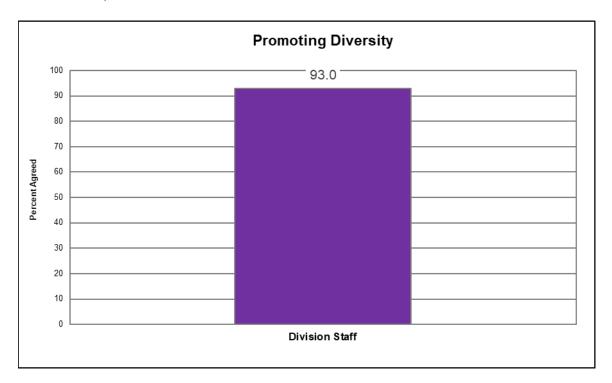

- **90.1%** agreed that their unique gifts and talents are recognized and celebrated at their school/site.

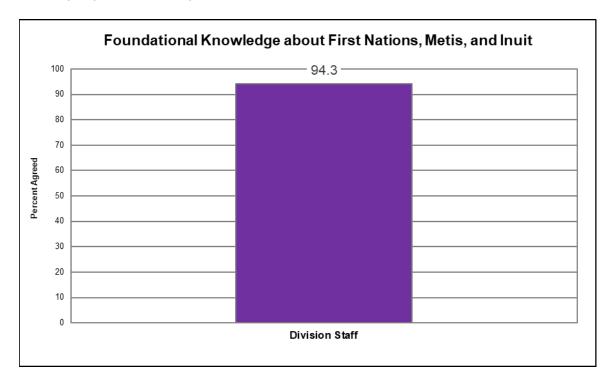

- **95.1%** indicated that the Division is working to advance the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action in schools and departments; and
- 93.5% agreed that their school/department/site provides them with opportunities to build their foundational knowledge about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit culture, history, perspectives, and experiences.

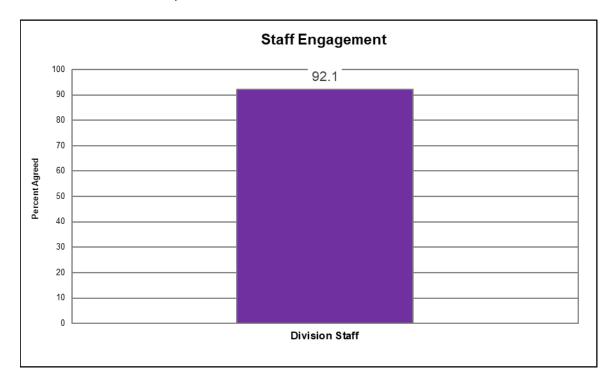

For the 2023/2024 school year, the result for the Foundational Knowledge about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit theme was 93.2% for Division staff. In considering the **Division staff**, results indicated that:

- 98.3% agreed that they contribute as a team member in their school/department;
- 93.3% indicated that their staff works as a team in their school/department;
- **91.0**% agreed that they have opportunities to voice their opinions and concerns at their school/department; and
- **85.9%** agreed that they have opportunities for a voice into decisions that affect their job at their school/department.

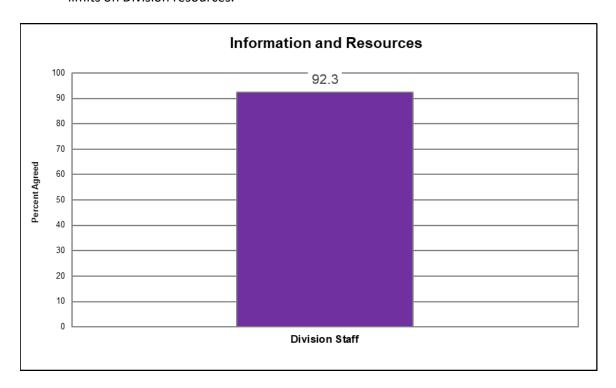

For the 2023/2024 school year, the result for the Staff Engagement theme was 92.2% for Division staff. It is important to note that the survey item associated with social justice activities was moved from the Staff Engagement theme to the Catholic Identity theme for this school year. In recalculating the 2023/2024 results by removing the survey item associated with social justice activities, the recalculated result would be 91.4% for Division staff for the Staff Engagement theme. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

7. Information and Resources – Reflects the Division Priority "Organizational Excellence"

In considering the **Division staff**, results indicated that:

- **97.2**% agreed that they are aware of the Division's Occupational Health and Safety Procedures;
- 93.5% indicated that their school/department provides them with the information they need in order to do their job;
- **92.3%** indicated that they read the communications from the Division (e.g., emails, WAGs);
- **91.1%** agreed that they are aware of the Division Plan for Continuous Growth for this school year; and
- **87.6%** indicated that they are provided with what they need to do their job given the limits on Division resources.



For the 2024/2025 school year, the result for the Information and Resources theme is provided in the chart above. For the 2023/2024 school year, the result for the Information and Resources theme was 91.8% for Division staff. As a reminder, caution should be used when comparing results across time.

8. PROFESSIONAL LEARNING AND IMPROVEMENT – REFLECTS THE DIVISION PRIORITY "LEARNING EXCELLENCE"

In considering the **Division staff**, results indicated that:

- **95.9%** agreed that their school/department expects them to participate in professional learning or training opportunities;
- **92.0%** agreed that their school/department focuses on continuous improvement through evidence-based decision-making;
- **90.3%** indicated that their principal/supervisor provides them with feedback to help them improve their work;
- 87.4% agreed that school/department-provided professional learning or training opportunities are useful to them; and
- **82.9%** agreed that Division-provided professional learning or training opportunities are useful to them.

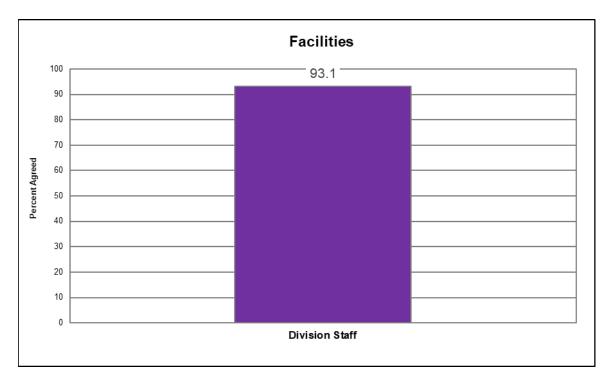

• 93.1% agreed that their school/site building is a safe and well-maintained facility.

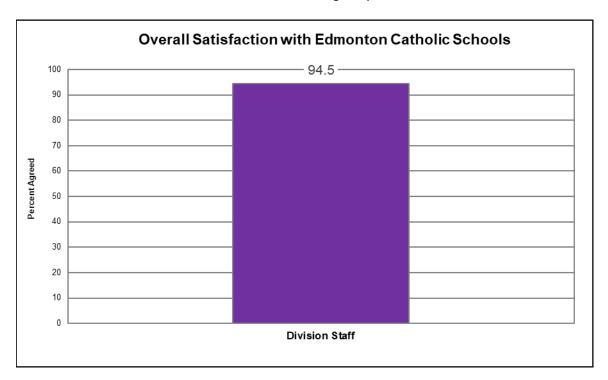

For the 2023/2024 school year, the result for the Overall Satisfaction with Edmonton Catholic Schools theme was 93.7% for Division staff. V. COMMENTS

In general, high rates of agreement were reported by Division staff. These results provide outcome measures necessary for Division assurance, information for setting priorities, identifying areas for growth, and recognizing areas of strength. A similar survey is planned for the 2025/2026 school year.

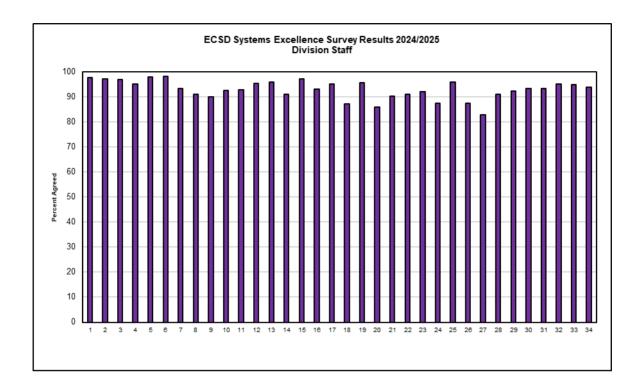

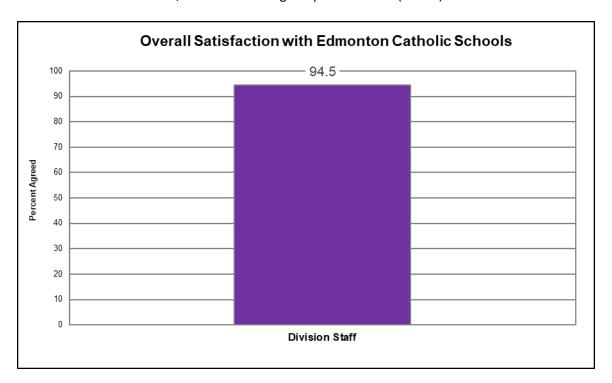

As we enter the season of Lent, the Board of Trustees encourages all members of our Edmonton Catholic Schools community to reflect on the profound themes of sacrifice, renewal, and hope. This sacred time invites us to deepen our faith, grow in our relationship with Christ, and renew our commitment to serving one another. We are proud to support the faith-filled experiences that take place across our schools during lent, including retreats, acts of service, and Lenten initiatives that inspire our students and staff to live out the values of compassion and justice.

Our advocacy as a board to government is very important, and we are pleased to announce that the Alberta Government has approved full construction funding for two new Kindergarten to Grade 9 Catholic Schools in West Laurel and Rivers Edge. The new Catholic K-9 school in West Laurel, which is designed to accommodate growth within the Ellerslie, Mill Woods, and Meadows Planning Sectors and is critically needed to serve the current and projected student population in the area, while the new Catholic K-9 school in Rivers Edge which will serve the communities of Edgemont, Rivers Edge, and Stillwater. It will relieve enrolment pressures at Good Shepherd Catholic Elementary School and Sister Annata Brockman Catholic Elementary/Junior High School. While securing funding for these two new schools is a significant milestone, our advocacy does not stop here. As our Division continues to expand, we remain dedicated to ensuring that Catholic education thrives and that students, families, and staff have the facilities and opportunities they need to succeed.

In March, we were also pleased to host the Community of School Councils' (COSC) evening, an in-person event that brought together our Trustees, Chief Superintendent, Division leaders, and staff for an evening of engaging sessions. This event provided an opportunity for families to explore various aspects of their child's educational experiences and the opportunities available to them. The purpose of the COSC evening is to foster meaningful dialogue between home and school, enhancing awareness and encouraging active participation in student learning. It was a wonderful evening of learning, connection, and community as we work together to support the growth and development of our students.

Re: Chief Superintendent's Report on #ECSDfaithinspires –March 2025

Background:

The 2024-2025 school year is one which is marked with great hope. Our Division theme for the year is People of Hope, and it echoes the theme for the Jubilee 2025, Pilgrims of Hope, that Pope Francis has declared. I wish to highlight some of my activities as Chief Superintendent alongside some of the happenings from the month of March, which, although shortened by Spring Break, remains very dynamic, as they relate to the framework of our Division Priorities: Living Our Faith, Learning Excellence, Organizational Excellence, and Embracing Diversity. These priorities can be explored more fully on ecsd.net under our Division Plan For Continuous Growth 2023-2026 (Year 2).

Living Our Faith

- Schools and site across the Division marked the beginning of Lent with traditional Shrove Tuesday events
 and Ash Wednesday liturgies. Students will now spend the next forty days reflecting on the journey of
 Jesus to his cross and the depth of his love for us.
- Our grade 8 students got to experience the joy of our annual Father Michael Mireau Youth Faith Day. We
 were able to return to an in-person event this year. They participated in Eucharistic liturgy and heard
 from internationally renowned youth catechist Jesse Manibusan, who shared his thoughts on the theme of
 "God is Love."

Learning Excellence

- The Division offers course challenges in a variety of languages. Students have the opportunity to demonstrate proficiency (culture, speaking, reading, writing) in six languages. A total of 284 students participated in the course challenge this year, an increase of 28 over last year. This year, our numbers were as follows: Filipino-63, French-74, Italian-3, Polish-12, Spanish-71, and Ukrainian-61. For successful completion, all students will submit two projects (one oral project and one written project) have a one-on-one Microsoft Teams virtual interview with the assessor and complete a written exam. Students wrote their exams at Lumen Christi this month as part of this journey.
- Students had the opportunity to perform at the Winspear for our annual Band Share Day. This is an
 exceptional opportunity for band students to experience the joy of performing in this world class concert
 facility.



Organizational Excellence

- Administration was pleased to support the Board in their efforts to create ongoing opportunities for dialogue between home and school to build awareness of and participation in student learning through their annual Community of School Councils meeting. Over three hundred parents, guardian, and school administrators registered for sessions that evening.
- The Division hosted its annual Career and Resource Event, which allows student teachers, teachers from
 other Divisions, and immigrant teachers to learn more about a career with Edmonton Catholic Schools.
 Over one hundred people came to meet with our staff from human Resource Services and our consultants
 and explore the opportunities that are available to support them as they live out their vocation with
 Edmonton Catholic Schools.
- Our Division acknowledged Replacement Staff Appreciation Week. These are unprecedented times in terms of being able to meet our staffing needs when absences occur. Replacement staff are vital to us, both in terms of being able to fulfil our mission to provide a Catholic education that inspires students to learn and that prepares them to live fully and to serve God in one another, and in our ability to maintain the wellness of all our staff.
- We have just completed our Administrator Placement cycle for the 2025-2026 school year. Communities will be informed of administrative changes in the upcoming weeks. The Placement Committee takes a data informed approach to this process that is rooted in the learning and program needs of the schools.

Embracing Diversity

- St. John XXIII Catholic School hosted our Division's traditional celebration of Francophone culture with the Caban a Sucre. It was a highly entertaining event that was well attended by families from across the Division.
- St. Benedict Catholic Elementary Schools hosted a Pipe Ceremony on behalf of the Division. This is a beautiful opportunity for students, staff, and guests, to experience a traditional sacred aspect of Indigenous culture and spirituality.
